Commission Opens Bids at Meeting Held June 1

Proposals will be opened by the state highway commission at its meeting in Portland June 1 on six highway improvement projects, five bridges, 12,000 barrels of cement and 1000 state highway signs.

Four wooden truss span bridges are to be built on the Crooked River highway, near Prineville, Crook county, and for one combined crossing over Spanish gulch and the Shaliko branch of the O. W. R. & N. railroad near Biggs, on the Columbia River highway, in Sherman county.

The 12,000 barrels of cement which the commission proposes to buy will be used for the Tamhill-McMinnville paving project.

Proposals will be received on the following road improvement projects: Clatsop county, Youngs Bay-Miles crossing section, Astoria-Seaside pro-

ject, 3500 lineal feet of concrete pavement 18 feet wide.

Gilliam county, Mayville-Thirty-Mile creek section of the Jora Day highway, seven miles of grading.

Jackson county, overcrossing approaches near Ashland.

Malheur county, nine-tenths mile of paving between Ontario and Snake river.

Umatilla county, Pilot Rock-Pendleton, 10.5 miles grading and surfacing.

Union county, Elgin-Minam section, nine miles of surfacing.
