

SCOUTS PLAN SUMMER CAMP

Banks of Salt Creek Near McCredie Hot Springs Will Be Rendezvous

Monday morning, June 14, the Boy Scout special train will leave Salem for the annual summer camp, which will be located in the Cascade range, 12 miles southeast of Oakridge.

It will be on the banks of Salt Creek, near McCredie Hot Springs, which are famous for their 15 geysers. There is also a swimming pool fed by the hot springs which

will be at the disposal of the Scouts. This will insure the boys plenty of aquatic sports under the direction of expert swimmers.

The train which will have the majority of Salem's 300 Boy Scouts on board will stop in Eugene long enough to allow the boys a parade and show the Eugene folks what a good looking bunch of Scouts Salem can produce. After leaving Eugene the train will proceed to Oakridge where dinner will be served, then will come the 12-mile hike to camp.

The camp will be situated in one of the prettiest spots in the Cascade range, with Salt Creek falls, which is over 200 feet high, Fern flat, Papoose rock, Bunchgrass ridge, Heckletooth mountain and numerous lakes in the immediate vicinity. There are several mountain streams nearby and the boys will have plenty of opportunities for fishing and
