Effective Sunday, May 29th, the S. P. & S. With the aid of a recently appointed council of experts, Jean Ogier, Minister of the Liberated Regions, promises to bring the devastated territory of France to its pre-war state within three years if the government will give reasonable economic relief which will enable the workers to maintain their families amid the shell torn ruins. The experts will not attempt to interfere with individual action but on the contrary will encourage it, giving advance information where materials and labor are most available. M. Ogier, criticizing the former ministry, said that the service was swayed too much by politicians, but now would be placed under sixteen practical architects, engineers and contractors, aided by the deputies of the liberated regions.
