She was the widow of the late William Stewart. The funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the Rigdon chapel. The body will later be sent to Kansas for burial.

**Water Applications.**—A. E. Routh of Enterprise has filed with the state engineering department an application for the appropriation of water from Hurricane creek for the irrigation of 22 acres in Walla Walla county. Other applications have been received as follows: By E. A. Hull, Freewater, covering the appropriation of water from the east branch of Little Walla Walla river for the irrigation of a small tract in Umatilla county. By L. C. Marsters of Pangallano, covering the appropriation of water from Willow springs, in Malheur county, for domestic purposes. By Clarence S. Miller of Catlow, covering the construction of a reservoir in Malheur county for the storage of 300 acre feet, and for the appropriation of the stored water for irrigation of 160 acres. By Rufus M. Dinwiddie, Jordan Valley, covering the construction of a small reservoir and the appropriation of the stored water for stock purposes.

**Test Case Heard.**—The test case of Salem school district No. 24 against W. M. Smith, Marion county school superintendent, to compel Smith to turn over to the school board several thousand dollars that was levied by the county as a special tax levy in excess of the 6 per cent constitutional limitation, was heard by the supreme court yesterday.

## Under Advisement.

The state desert land board, at a meeting yesterday, took under advisement a request of the Walker Basin irrigation company to increase liens per acre in the project from \$40 to \$60. The lien represents the right of the company to dispose of the land to settlers. The project comprises 27,000 acres and originally was the J. E. Morson project.

Forbes filed his discharge which shows that he was a private in the infantry and spent five months at Camp Fremont, Cal.
