COMPLAINTS AT BLIND SCHOOL GIVEN AIRING

Mrs. Casteel of Umatilla County Charges Superintendent With Neglect

PETITION IS PRESENTED
Control Board Finds No Fault With Conduct of State Institution

Mrs. Fred Casteel of Umatilla county, who has three children in the state school for the blind, appeared before the state board of control yesterday with complaints against Superintendent J. E. Howard, whom she accused of neglect in failing to notify her of the illness of one of her children. Mr. Howard and his wife, who is a teacher in the institution, also were present, together with several witnesses, and a formal hearing was given.

The board did not find against Superintendent Howard, although the opinion of the members seemed to be, and Mrs. Casteel agreed, that Mrs. Casteel should have been notified sooner. It was shown, however, that the child's illness was not considered serious by Salem physicians until after Mrs. Casteel arrived in Salem, she having been summoned by a telegram from her oldest son in the school. It has developed that the sick boy has typhoid fever, but he apparently is progressing favorably.

Mrs. Casteel has given him her personal attention since her arrival two weeks ago.

She said Superintendent Howard had harshly reprimanded the oldest son for sending the telegram without permission. Mr. Howard said he had not been harsh with the boy, but that it was contrary to rules for the children to send telegrams without permission for the reason that there is danger of causing parents undue uneasiness.

A petition signed by 17 pupils at the school was presented to the board finding fault with the management and making various charges. The petition was given consideration. They appeared to grow out of disciplinary measures that have been instituted by Mr. Howard.

Segregation of the boys from the girls has been established except at the social hour each evening. This has caused considerable complaint, but Mr. and Mrs. Howard declared that the Salem institution for the blind doubtless had been the only one in the United States where boys and girls had been allowed to mingle at all times.

The condition, it was asserted, worked to the detriment of the institution. Both Mr. and Mrs. Howard are experienced teachers of the blind, having been employed in a Michigan institution much larger than the Oregon school. They showed that harsh punishment, such as corporal punishment and feeding on bread and water, that are used in some schools for the blind are not used here.

"We need all the room there is here," explained Mr. Albert. "We can accommodate only 200 cars, and when the season really starts there will be that many here every night." The committee in charge of the improving of the park seems to have a remarkable way of anticipating possible wants of the passing tourist. A telephone will be installed in the office, which is a small building near the main entrance of the park, and will be placed in such a manner that visitors wishing to phone when the caretaker is away will find the instrument in a small box just outside the wall. There is to be a registry book so that every person may place his name and the number of his car. In this manner the city can keep an accurate record of the cars passing through during the summer, and parties may trace friends who may be on the road. Everything in the new camping ground will be free, except a small fee for checking baggage at the office. Road maps and information will be given out and everything done to help the tourist see this section of the country. Three families from Dakota who stopped for a few days in the camp grounds have become so enamored with this locality they have purchased homes here and decided to stay.
