

NIGHT SHIFTS ARE CUT OFF

Unshipped Lumber Accumulation in Northwest Influences Less Production

Unshipped lumber accumulating at Oregon and Washington mills is influencing decreased production. Shortage of cars and ships has

again developed a physical congestion which is automatically curtailing output. Space for added stocks is becoming short. From all producing regions there are reports of the discontinuance of night operations. During the past month mills of the West Coast Lumbermen's association produced more lumber and shipped relatively less than any other producing region in the United States or Canada. Shipping conditions are apparently going from bad to worse. Last week 119 association mills produced 23,612,202 feet of lumber, and only shipped 46,860,000 feet by rail. However, the same mills re-

ported water shipments amounting to 22,932,512 feet. The unshipped balance in rail orders is 229,140,000 feet, domestic cargoes, 61,034,846 feet, and export, 66,733,689 feet. Total of unshipped at 118 mills, 356,908,555 feet. Buying, always light on a falling market, is showing signs of life—probably due to the certainty of an early and heavy advance in freight rates. Practically all large buyers are said to be planning to get under cover ahead of this increased transportation charge.

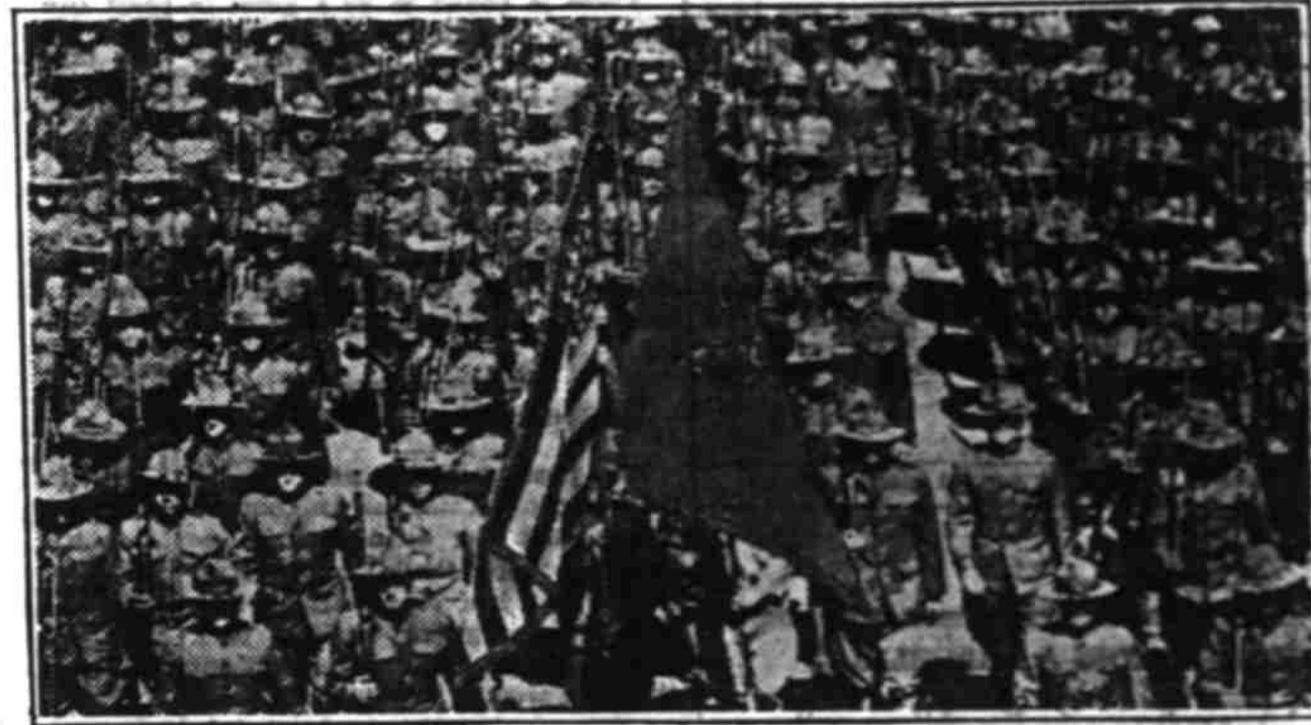
