

U. OF O. TO HAVE HIGH SCHOOL

Complete Course to be Given
Under Department of
Education

EUGENE, Or., June 3.—Plans for a complete high school course in the University of Oregon high school have been definitely announced by Earl Douglass, professor of second-

ary education at the university. Since the school was started a number of years ago, only four years out of the six designed for the school have been given, commencing at the seventh grade. With the fall term of 1920, however, the eleventh grade will be added and during the following year the twelfth grade. In the meantime those students who, under the present arrangement of the curriculum, have been able to carry work in five subjects will be graduated at the end of the eleventh grade with full high school credits. Those who are able to carry full work thereafter can complete the course in five years, thus being able to enter college or begin other work a year earlier, says Professor Douglass.

METHOD OF CONVENTION UNDER HEAVY FIRE

reputated committeemen, in defiance of the popular judgment already rendered, are seeking to impose their peevish purpose upon the convention, the party and the country.

"Certain facts are outstanding in the compilation of pre-convention events. Chief among these is the demonstrated fact that three have shown themselves to possess widespread and well founded support among Republicans. These men, in the order of their demonstrated strength, are General Wood, Senator Johnson and Mr. Hoover.

Senator Moses' statement was issued on his own responsibility and without either the knowledge or approval of other Wood managers. It was predicted by some of the Wood partisans that repudiation might develop and possibly entail a readjustment of the Wood management.

Conference Called. Colonel Procter and others in Wood headquarters, called a conference tonight after hearing of Senator Moses' statement, and it was indicated that a statement from the Wood headquarters was under consideration.

Lowden and Johnson managers both hailed the Moses statement with satisfaction. The Lowden supporters professed to believe that the statement would not injure but might help the governor's campaign.

They pointed out that Senator Moses' attack was made upon the national committee with its influential membership and not upon the governor or his managers. From the Johnson camp came the declaration that Senator Moses' position indicated that both the Wood and Johnson forces could be expected to oppose nominations of any man named by the "old guard." The friends of Senator Johnson, however, scouted the present possibility of a coalition with the Wood strength in the convention in behalf of either Wood or Johnson.

After considering Senator Moses' statements the other Wood managers apparently decided to withhold comment upon it. It was indicated that no announcement would be made until later.

When General Wood learned of Senator Moses' announcement, he issued a statement saying he was "loath to believe" that "any selfish or personal interest would be permitted to outweigh those of the public good." In the decisions handed down by the national committee and added his belief that "Charman Hays is absolutely fair in his handling of the situation."

KING'S COMPANY TO REORGANIZE

Plan to Increase Capital to
Million Favored by Commercial Club

The Kings Food Products company has completed arrangements whereby the firm expects to enlarge its dehydrating plants in Salem and The Dalles. This company will make an extensive campaign for funds and in reorganizing expects to increase the capital to \$1,000,000. Portland capitalists have already subscribed \$700,000. The Dalles has taken \$150,000 and the remaining \$150,000 will be offered in this city.

There is a 7 per cent annual dividend offered by the company plus the dividends of the common stock. Improvements will be made to the local plant in order to handle a larger business. The output for this season has already been contracted for by eastern markets.

The board of directors of the Salem Commercial club greatly favors the plan proposed by the company and has passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Kings Food Products company of Oregon owns and operates a large dehydrating plant in Salem, Oregon, and

"Whereas, said King's company is being reorganized and refinanced

at this time on a large scale and substantial basis, and

"Whereas, Portland interests are offering to provide 70 per cent of the funds needed for said reorganization and refinancing, and,

"Whereas, this community is being asked to participate in this reorganization and refinancing to the extent of 15 per cent of the total, and,

"Whereas, the value and importance of this industry to Salem and community is well recognized as one of our large and sustaining institutions and whose success and continued operation means much to the prosperity to this part of Oregon, and,

"Whereas, due consideration and investigation has been given to the soundness and advisability of said reorganization and refinancing, and,

"Whereas, the Commercial club of Salem has been asked to give its endorsement and support to this undertaking and to recommend to our people that they give their unqualified financial and moral support to this plan,

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the board of directors in regular meeting assembled does hereby, after due and serious consideration, give its unqualified endorsement to this proposition and recommend to the people of Salem and vicinity that they give this industry and the Portland interests who are investing so much money in a Salem industry their financial and moral support to their utmost by purchasing securities of the Kings Food Products company to the limit asked, and,

"That a committee be appointed for the purpose of carrying to the financial conclusion the part asked in the refinancing plan and to impress upon our people the importance and necessity of the same to our community, and,

"That a copy of this resolution be spread on the minutes of the Commercial club of Salem and a copy be delivered to the Kings Food Products company and a copy be handed to the press for publication."

THE DALLES, June 4.—Horribly burned as the result of a steam pipe explosion at Fallbridge, Wash., Edwin Egan, died in a hospital late yesterday. Egan was a stationary engineer at Fallbridge. About 2 o'clock Wednesday morning when he entered his engine room, a steam pipe burst. Clouds of steam enveloped Egan. The detonation of the explosion brought aid. Egan, terribly scalded, was rushed to the hospital but despite every effort, he died.
