The largest song recital ever given in Salem was the program presented at the First Christian church last Thursday evening by the pupils of Lena Belle Tartar. The numbers rendered were representative of the best that has been written in ballad music, and as to variety of text and contrast in style were arranged in a most skillful manner. The voices of 14 singers have been trained to develop the individual characteristics of each, were heard to splendid advantage in solos. All did exceptionally well; one sang off pitch, the tonal quality was beautiful throughout, and the pronunciation was a joy to the entire audience.

Miss Lucile Ross, who has been studio accompanist for Miss Tartar the past two years, distinguished herself with her command of the music, her animation and sympathy. Early in the program she played an organ solo that was most charming. Miss Ross has made great advancement during the past year, and friends predict a brilliant future for her musically.

Gwendolyn Jarman and Angela Sundin, violinists, captivated the audience with the "Organ Grinder Song," and were enthusiastically endorsed. Geneva Sundin played the piano accompaniment.

Master Gordon Bennett took the audience by storm with his motion song, "Three Little Orioles."

The culminating feature of the program was a group of four-part choral numbers, sung by a women's chorus of 20 voices, all students of Miss Tartar. Accurate and clear attack, delicate shading, clear enunciation and a harmonious blending of all voices characterized this number.
