State Labor Official to Help Berry Growers

C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, has sent to the berry growers of the state a letter and a questionnaire asking them for information relative to their labor needs when the berry picking season comes on. To obtain lists of the growers' names the commissioner applied to the canneries. It is said there is not now a serious shortage, but that the advent of warm weather will bring the harvest season on with a rush that may result in a serious shortage. Mr. Gram is co-operating with the municipal and the federal employment agencies in Portland.

Bernard Daly Bequests Subject to State Tax

Attorney General Brown yesterday completed an opinion holding that the estate of the late Judge Bernard Daly of Lake county, amounting to about \$800,000 and bequeathed to the worthy boys and girls of that county for educational purposes, is subject to the state inheritance tax law. The inheritance tax will amount to approximately \$170,000. The will

stipulated that the funds of the estate be held in trust and used to pay for the education of the beneficiaries in the colleges and technical schools of Oregon. The opinion of the attorney general holds that it is the boys and girls who are benefited by the will, not the schools, the county or the state.

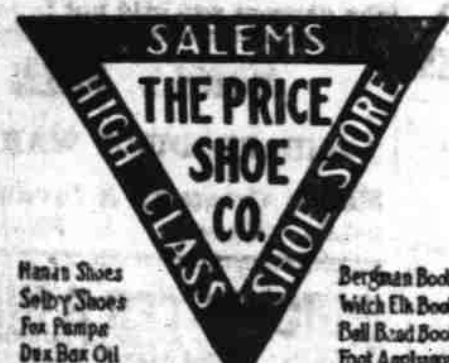
