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PLAYGROUND IS NOT APPROVED

City Council Kills Move—Simeral Protest Is Indefinitely Postponed

The public park committee last night reported favorably on the bill which is before the city council for the purchasing of certain property for the purpose of establishing a children's playgrounds. But when a motion was made to have the ordinance committee instructed to draw up an ordinance calling for the purchase of the ground, the council voted it down.

The Rotary club has agreed to equip the grounds completely if the city will buy the land, but the members of the council who voted no seem to think that the expense of purchasing the property is too much for the city to undertake.

A remonstrance against the removal of the street car track on North Summer street was received by the council from over a hundred persons who reside in that vicinity. Numerous streets, alley and sidewalk improvement petitions and bills were received by the council. All of the petitions were referred to the street or sidewalk committee and the improvement bills were all adopted by the council. A bill calling for an extension of a spur track across the old Turner road to be built by the Standard Oil company came up for the third reading and the application was granted. A communication from L. J. Simeral, defeated candidate for city councilman from ward 1 in the election held May 21, protesting the election of H. H. Vandervort, his successful rival. Mr. Simeral alleged in a letter that Vandervort had circulated a petition calling for a term of office for two years and that after getting a sufficient number of signatures, he had changed the petition to read a four-year term. The council voted to receive the communication and then indefinitely postpone action on it.

Councilman Volk introduced a petition to amend the ordinance on speeding. The ordinance as it now stands says that a person can be fined from \$5 to \$50 for the first offense and from \$50 to \$100 for the second offense. The amendment calls for the imprisonment of the offender as well as a fine. The council voted to refer the petition to the ordinance committee.

The bill fixing the salary of the chief of police was read for the third time and it was voted that he would receive the benefit of the increase from \$1200 to \$1800 a year from May 21, 1920.

A sidewalk ordinance was adopted by the council calling for a fine or imprisonment of any person who has started improvements on a sidewalk which does not conform with the grading of the street on which it is located, 10 days after being notified to improve the sidewalk by the street committee. The committee passed a motion to allow Fire Chief Hutton railway expenses to Los Angeles and back, to attend the Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs' convention, which will be held in that city some time this summer.

The biggest items of campaign expense that were reported to Secretary of State Kozler were those of T. B. Neuhausen, as chairman of the Stanfield for Senator committee, and Leon B. JAPS MURDERED. HONOLULU, T. H., June 7.—Several hundred Japanese, including women and children, were murdered by the Bolsheviks in the attack on Nikolayevsk, Siberia, March 12, the Japanese war office announced, according to a Tokio cable received today by Nippon Jiji, Japanese language newspaper here. The war office statement said the murders were confirmed by the evidence of Russian witnesses.

Japanese commander Major Mikaya defended the consulate with a few troops, and although greatly outnumbered, held for five days against the attack, the statement continued. The Japanese then burned the building, destroying the documents and the commander committed suicide, the report said.

No Japanese were left in Nikolayevsk.
