STATE HOUSERS BEAT WEAVERS

Another Close Score Game Is
Played in Twilight League
Series

The Statehouse Stars vanquished the Kay Weavers last night in another good game of ball, featured mainly by a pitchers' battle between Webb and Bettles.

The little Chemawa twirler was on the mound for the Kay contingent and pitched a sterling brand of ball for all that his team suffered a shut-out. Webb toiled for the statehouse-ers and threw a steadier game than Bettles, walking one man where Bettles passed six. The little Chemawa star whiffed 10 batters, however, while Webb sent six back to the bench. The score was 2 to 0.

The game was characterized by a brand of errorless ball, both pitchers getting good support, but with each shouldering most of the work. The statehouse-ers exhibited the most "pep" and it was the fight that they put into the game which won for them.

The statehouse garnered their first score in the first frame when Crais hoisted one of Bettles fast ones into a hole in right field while "Charley" romped home during the futile hunt for the spheroid. Not until the last frame did the statehouse put another tally across when Kneckerbocker walked, took second on a wild pitch by Bettles and stole third, taking advantage of Bettles windmill wind-up the statehouse second-stack-

er stole home, sliding into a close decision. This ended the scoring for the day. The Kays did not threaten to score at any time, only one man getting as far as second during the fray.

The statehouse garnered three hits off Bettles' delivery while Webb allowed the Weavers but one blow. The Kays pulled off the lone double-play of the game, Dutch to Mentor in the third inning. The game was well worth watching, as have been most of the games of the present twilight series and local fans are missing a lot of "kick" if they love good clean baseball which is instilled with a lot of hot rivalry, when they fall to journey to Sweetland Field at 6:30 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights.

sides were to be presented the allotment was 15 minutes in all, equally divided, and on all other subjects it was five minutes.

Among those who appeared today and tonight were Professor Irving Fisher of Yale, who advocated an investigation of currency inflation, former Representative Charles N. Fowler of New Jersey, advocating

revision of the banking and currency laws, and S. P. Bond of Missouri, who wanted price fixing in war time declared in violation of the constitution.

Tomorrow Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor is to present his program. Henry Lane Wilson, former ambassador to Mexico, is to recommend a Mexican plank, and a delegation headed by Frank P. Walsh is to argue for a plank advocating Irish freedom.

County Tenure of Office Bill Filed With Kozier

Completed initiative petitions relative to a bill to increase the tenure of office of certain county officials from two to four years, were filed with the secretary of state yesterday, containing more than 10,000 names. The bill is being initiated by Herbert R. Stewart of Portland and R. J.

Green of La Grande. The officers affected are those of county clerk, treasurer, sheriff, coroner and surveyor. Should the bill pass, it would become effective in January, 1921, and would apply to county officials elected in the general elections of next November.
