Boy Scouts Sell Paper for Portland Concern

Salem Scouts will today move the great quantity of paper which they recently collected in this city, to the cars for shipment, it having been sold to the Northwest Waste & Cotton company of Portland, for a consideration of approximately \$1,500. This sum falls far short of the amount which was expected from the paper, quotations having been made on the May, 1920 prices, but since the shipment was unavoidably deferred until the present time, and the June scale having slumped considerably for this product for exportation, the selling price of the paper does not equal that which was hoped for in order to build up the Boy Scout treasury.

However, the Scouts are not quitting on the job, and as soon as they return from their annual summer encampment, which starts next Monday, another paper drive will be staged in an attempt to land at least an equal amount of paper and thus secure the remainder of the coin necessary to provide equipment for the Scout program.
