

SUBSTITUTE IS HELD NECESSARY

Democratic State Committee to Name Man in Place of Senator Baldwin

To fill the vacancy in the Democratic delegation to the national convention at San Francisco caused by the death of Senator George T. Baldwin of Klamath Falls, it is said here that the procedure probably would be for the state central committee to appoint a delegate. It will then be for the convention to decide whether the delegate shall be seated. Senator Baldwin was elected as one of the four delegates from the state at large. Complete returns received by the secretary of state

show that the four delegates elected from the state at large, and the votes they received are: T. H. Crawford, Portland, 15,904; Will E. Purdy, Salem, 14,886; Maria L. T. Hidden, Portland, 12,381; George T. Baldwin, Klamath Falls, 11,221. The two elected from each of the three congressional districts and their votes were: First district: Lee M. Travis, Eugene, 6785; W. H. Downing, Salem, 5730. Second district—Will R. King, Ontario, 2957; George B. Blakely, The Dalles, 2691. Third district: John H. Stevenson, Portland, 3128; Bessie M. Richards, Portland, 3096. The unofficial returns were completed by Secretary of State Kozer yesterday upon receipt of belated abstracts of the votes in Jackson and Marion counties. The returns will be canvassed officially at once and credentials sent the delegates in
