Freight Rates May Be Raised Says Commission
WASHINGTON, June 11.—Pacific coast and southwestern state railway commissioners today determinedly opposed before the interstate commerce commission the proposed increase in railroad freight rates.

"You could increase rates overnight, but it would avail nothing unless you adjusted the labor troubles," declared J. B. Campbell of Spokane, Wash., representing shippers and the state commissions of Washington, Montana, Idaho, Utah, New Mexico, Nevada and Arizona.

"If the terms of the new transportation act are to be construed to mean that the carriers shall be granted increased rates every time and as often as they are able to show that their combined incomes do not amount to 6 per cent on the aggregate of their book values, then may the lord help the shipping and consuming public."
