MOTORCYCLE MEN COME IN DROVES

Impressive Spectacle Will be Annual Gypsy Tour Event in Salem

Annually during the month of June a national event is held through out the United States called the gypsy tour. Salem is fortunate this year to have the gypsy tour of the Willamette valley held here June 19 and 20.

Contrary to the common impression this is not an invasion of the ancient rovers of the land—the gypsies. This is a tour of the leading motorcycle clubs of the Willamette valley. The Rose City Motorcycle club of Portland will be represented a hundred strong.

Arrangements are now complete for the two-day convention of the motorcycle men. They will encamp at the city camping grounds at Oak and Winter streets, Saturday evening, June 19 at the camping grounds there will be a huge bonfire, speeches and other carnival stunts.

Saturday afternoon a hill climbing contest will be held on the Turner road east of town. The leading riders of the northwest are scheduled to take part in this contest.

Sunday, June 20, the activities will shift to the picnic grounds on the Wallace road north of town. It will be a busy day occupied with stunts on the motorcycle. There will be motorcycle sand races, broad jumps, pie eating contest and other ingenious contests on the two-wheeled motors.

The Salem public is invited to attend the activities and the program for the two-day gypsy tour.

Railroad Commissions Ready to Begin Fight

Mr. Williams says indications point to a strong defense against the applicants. He thinks the highway commission difficulties will be adjusted. The hearing, Mr. Williams believes, will continue for another two weeks. The express hearing is to begin June 28. Williams expects to return to Oregon June 20.
