Oregon will add 180 miles of state highways. Roadways will be graded and rockbed but no summer sessions of State Normal school for eastern Oregon teachers.

Only one-fifth of total vote of state was cast at primary.

August Saucier Killed When Motorcycle Skids

August Saucier, an employee on the dairy farm of Russell Catlin, was killed on State street at Fourteenth early Sunday night when his motorcycle skidded on street car tracks, throwing him in front of an automobile.

Saucier was following a truck and when the intersection was reached, attempted to pass the truck. He fell as the automobile approached from the opposite direction.

Mr. Saucier was 27 years old and had made his home in Salem about 18 years. He leaves his father, Anket Saucier of Quebec, three brothers, Richard F. Saucier of Mill City where he is engineer for the Hammond Lumber company, C. O. Saucier of Quebec and Albert Saucier of Quebec, and two sisters, Mrs. Eugenia Neal of Silver Creek Falls, and Mrs. Alexina Marquier of Quebec.

The funeral will be held from the Rigdon chapel this morning at 11 o'clock. Rev. Father De Rouin of St. Joseph's Catholic church will conduct the service and burial will be in City View cemetery.

CAMPMEETING COMES TO END

Immersion of Many Converts Sunday Morning Is Impressive Scene

The big campmeeting of the Seventh Day Adventists is over. Today finds all the campers gone and the fairgrounds deserted save for the tents down.

The meeting has been one of the most successful in the history of the work of the Adventists of Oregon.

Altogether there was raised during the campmeeting nearly \$20,000. About half of this amount goes to the work of foreign missions, the other half to the further development of the work in Oregon.

Sunday morning there were immersed in Mill creek near Summer street bridge 32 new converts who had taken their stand for God during the campmeeting.

Evangelist A. R. Bell of this city, with Evangelist L. R. Dickson of Portland and Prof. G. E. Johnson of Astoria, administered the ordinance. A tremendous crowd gathered to witness the scene.

The last meeting was in charge of Evangelist Dickson of Portland. The big pavilion was crowded. His subject was "The Great Crisis in Human History. Is Armageddon Past or Future? Has the Last Battle Been Fought?"

The evangelist took up the eastern question, more familiarly known as the Turkish question, and showed from the Bible that the Turk is to be driven from Europe, that he is to set up the seat of his government at Jerusalem, and that very experience is practically the beginning of Armageddon spoken in Revelation 16 and the fulfillment of the prophecy of Dan. 12:1.

"And there shall be a time of trouble, such as never was since there was a nation even to that time; and at that time they shall be delivered, every one that shall be found written in the book."

"And many of them that sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt."

"The great crisis of Armageddon finishes the history of the world and ushers in the glorious kingdom of the Prince of Peace," he said.

"How shall we curb the criminal rapacity of the profiteer?" sternly demanded the horse-faced gent. "How shall we rescue the nation from his octopus-like clutch?"
