## Anti Bolsheviki Move Forward in Crimea

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 14.—The forces of General Wrangel, anti-bolshevik leader on the Crimean front, are moving northward from the Crimea and Sea of Azov in three columns. They have been phenomenally successful against the bolsheviks and have established a front along Kaskovka on the Dnieper eastward through Mitopol to Maripol. General Wrangel's troops have captured 4000 prisoners and forty big guns of three 100 estimated in possession of the bolsheviks. They have lost only 800 men. General Shahoff is in command of the eastern wing and General Koutopof the right wing of the bolsheviks concentrating from the Maripol region to Alexandrovsk.

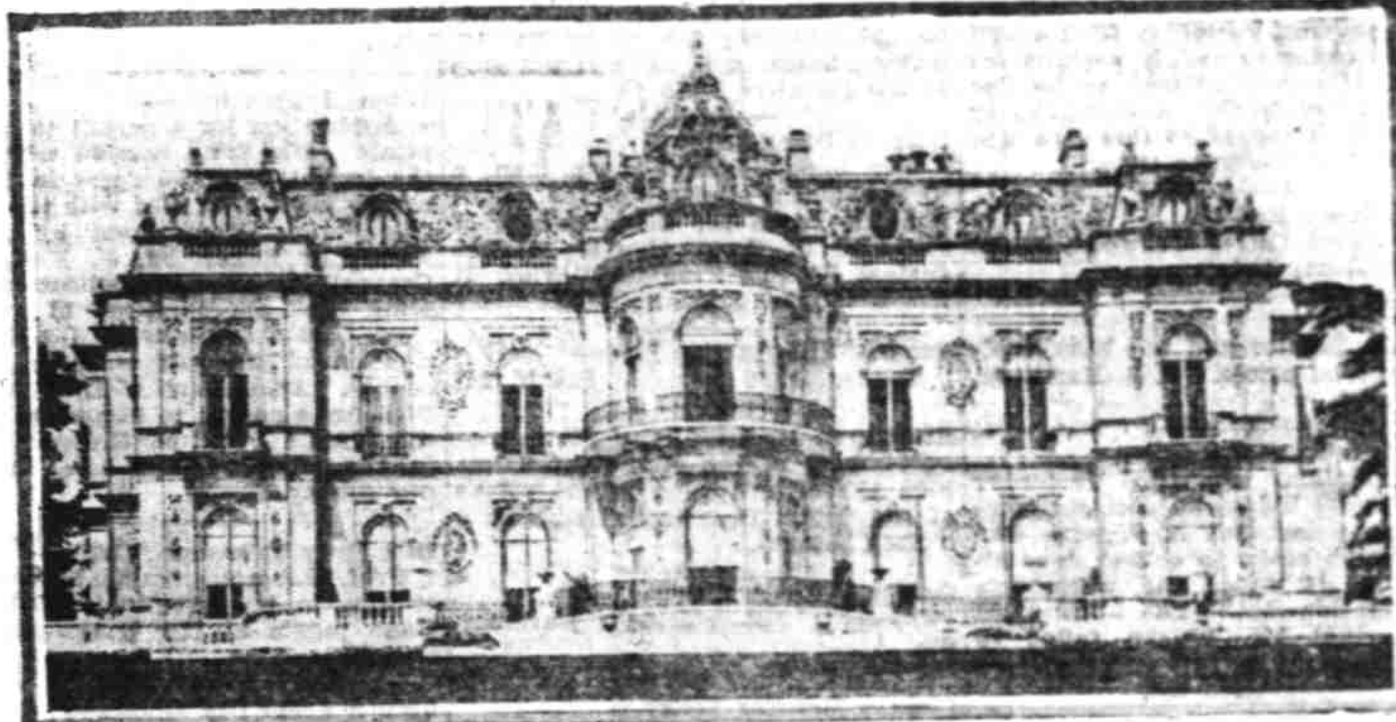

### Dempsey May Face Second Draft Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, June 15.—Whether "Jack" Dempsey must face a second trial tomorrow on a charge of conspiracy to evade the selective draft act will be determined tomorrow morning, Colonel Charles W. Thomas, assistant United States district attorney, said tonight. Dempsey today was acquitted on a charge of evading the draft act. Jack Kearns, his manager, is indicted with him on the conspiracy charge and on conclusion of Dempsey's trial today they were ordered to appear to enter a plea in the second action tomorrow.

Dempsey's acquittal was the signal for a demonstration by spectators such as seldom has been witnessed in a federal court here.

Counsel for Dempsey and Kearns announced that dismissal of the conspiracy charge would be asked when it was called up tomorrow.

### Jack Johnson Still Over Mexican Border

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 15.—Despite reports that Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, would be sent across the line from Mexico or would come across into the United States today, he was still at Tijuana, Lower California, a few miles from this city tonight.

### INCOME TAX CHECKS LARGE.

CHICAGO, June 15.—Fourteen checks for more than \$1,000,000 from firms and individuals were received today by the internal revenue department in payment of the second installment of the 1919 income tax. The largest check was for \$5,000,000, while another was for \$5,000,000.

### ASK UNIFORM AUTO LAWS.

ST. LOUIS, June 15.—A campaign for enactment of uniform automobile laws in all states was authorized at a meeting of directors of the national automobile dealers' association today. The proposed campaign is expected to begin next September.

## Georges Carpentier Not to Fight Until October

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 15.—Announcement was made here tonight by Jack Curley, boxing promoter that the bout between Georges Carpentier, French heavyweight, and Battling Levinsky set for July 26 in New York had been postponed until October 10.

Announcement also was made by Carley that Carpentier, his wife, and Francis Deschamps, his manager, would sail from New York for France July 19. Carpentier and Deschamps, it was stated, would return to the United States in time for Carpentier to train for the bout.

Carpentier received the news of the acquittal of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, in San Francisco today on charges of conspiracy to evade the draft laws when he arrived here this evening. He declared the verdict removed the last obstacles in the way of a match between Dempsey and himself.

## Army Officer's Wife Meets Death

ROCKFORD, Ill., June 16.—While riding with friends in an auto on the outskirts of Camp Grant last night, Mrs. Moss, wife of Captain Moss, camp utility officer, was shot in the back of the head from ambush and died shortly afterwards. The automobile had just passed four soldiers on the road when they heard a noise like the explosion of a tire. The officers stopped the machine and discovered the woman in the rear seat wounded. The four soldiers fled. Camp authorities caused roll to be called in every unit in the camp. A search for the four soldiers was made. They had not been captured at an early hour this morning.

### WOMEN LOSE VOTE

BATON ROUGE, La., June 15.—All possibility of action by the Louisiana legislature to enfranchise the women of the nation before the November election was removed today, the house voting down, 67 to 44 the federal ratification resolution then adopting 60 to 29 a resolution flatly opposing federal suffrage. The federal ratification failed in the senate last week and a measure granting state suffrage was today made a special order in the senate for Thursday. The state suffrage measure has been passed by the public.

### MARION MCCLAIN RE-ELECTED

EUGENE, Ore., June 15.—Marion McClain was today re-elected to the position of graduate manager of athletics at the University of Oregon. He just completed his first year in that capacity.
