

CHICAGO MAY BE WOOL CENTER

Steps Taken by Growers to Make City's Market Lead All World

CHICAGO, June 17.—Steps to make Chicago the wool center of America were taken here today at a conference of wool growers and bankers, with decision to name a committee to place the question before the public. The committee will be appointed by William J. Williams, president of the Wyoming Wool Growers' association who presided.

Under the proposition approved by the meeting called by representatives of the American Wool Growers' association, the movement of the

wool clip for 1920 would be financed by Chicago bankers, which would require \$100,000,000 annually. Heretofore this has been done by Boston banks, who have been compelled, it was said, to relinquish their financial support due to demands for funds from other sources.

It was announced that the plan was favorably received by Chicago financiers, who, it was added, desired cooperation and support of western bankers in the extension of the credits required. The fund, it was stated, would be used to carry the wool through the warehouses, where the bulk of the product is stored pending better market conditions.

Senators Hitchcock of Nebraska, Walsh of Montana, Pittman of Nevada, Chamberlain of Oregon and King of Utah, joined in calling the conference. Conditions in the wool market, they said, in summoning the bankers and growers, were similar to those prevailing with cotton in

1914, there being neither actual nor speculative demand, with the wool growers unable to obtain loans to finance them while awaiting a profitable market.

Carleton Superintendent of Schools in Eugene

E. F. Carleton, who for 16 years has been assistant state superintendent of Oregon schools, has been elected city superintendent of the schools at Eugene for the school year 1920-1921, and has accepted the position.

Eugene Mr. Carleton will succeed W. R. Rutherford, who will do educational work in the navy. Mr. Carleton is a graduate of the University of Oregon. He is familiar with school conditions in Eugene.

Plans Are Adopted for New State Dormitory

The state board of control yesterday adopted plans and specifications for a new dormitory at the state school for the feeble-minded for children under five years old, provided for by an act and an appropriation of the 1919 session of the legislature. Bids will be opened July 7.

The estimated cost of construction and furnishing the building is \$40,000, the amount of the appropriation. Prior to this children younger than 5 years have not been admitted to the school.

The building will be of brick construction, two stories high with basement and will be heated from the central heating plant. The dimensions will be 125 by 45 feet. For the convenience and safety of small children the entrance will be flush with the surface of the ground and instead of stairways, inclined planes will be installed for reaching the second floor.

The building probably will be completed by January 1.

Sunday from the Mennonite church at Pratum and burial will be in the Mennonite cemetery at that place, under the direction of the Rigdon establishment.

Inquiry For Caruso Jewels Starts Off

EAST HAMPTON, N. Y., June 18.—The "John Doe" inquiry into the \$300,000 jewel theft from the summer home of Enrico Caruso noted today.

The hearing was public and Mrs. Caruso was the first witness. She said she last had seen the gems Saturday morning, June 6, preceding

the theft when, returning from New York, she locked up \$89,000 worth of jewelry she had been wearing. She fixed \$400,000 to \$500,000 as their replacement value.

Mrs. Caruso declared that her personal maid, and "perhaps two other maids" knew where the keys to her jewel case were kept but she said she did not believe George Fitzgerald, the Caruso chauffeur knew.

Asked whether the box could be opened without setting off the burglar alarm, she replied: "Well I know it can, but I don't know about the others."

Sugar To Arrive From Argentine About July 1

United States government had no connection with the recent purchase of 14,000 tons of Argentine sugar beyond lending its influence to have export restrictions removed. Howard Fig. special assistant to the attorney general announced today. First reports that this was a government purchase, Mr. Fig said, "has caused considerable confusion in the public mind as well as in official circles."

American interests who purchased the sugar have since cooperated with the department of justice in working out plans for distributing it to the essential industries. It was estimated that the 14,000 tons will be sufficient to supply these industries for 60 days and thereby release other sugar stocks for distribution among housewives during the approaching canning season.

The Argentine sugar, said Mr. Fig, is expected to arrive between July 1 and September 15.

JAMES HERVEY HYSLOP DEAD

NEW YORK, June 17.—James Hervey Hyslop, secretary and director of research of the American Society for psychical research, died today after a long illness in Upper Montclair, N. J., it was announced here today. Death was due to thrombosis. He was 60 years old.

Having long been interested in psychic phenomena, Dr. Hyslop in 1907 raised an endowment fund of \$175,000 for the reestablishment of the American society of psychical research which dissolved following the death of its secretary. In a biographical sketch issued today by the society, Dr. Hyslop is described as "formerly a materialist and agnostic" who became "convinced that demonstrative evidence of the continuance of human life after bodily death exists."

LIQUOR TAXABLE

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 18.—Private stocks of alcoholic liquors, although not saleable, are taxable, and citizens who stocked up heavily prior to the enactment of national prohibition must continue to pay tax on their wet goods until they have been consumed.

This was the ruling made today by Attorney General U. S. Webb, in reply to a question from District Attorney G. W. Hoyle of Sonoma county. Assessors will hold that the liquor is legally held.
