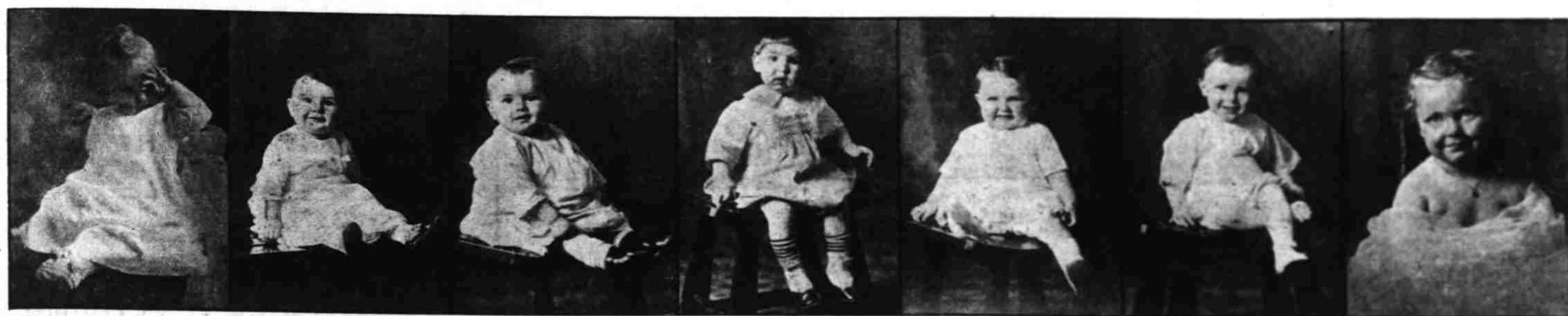

and measures that should be carefully studied by parents. The child should be weighed without shoes and clothing. For measuring have the child stand against the wall, heels together, and against the baseboard. Place a book edgewise on his head and against the wall in order to determine the point from which to begin the measurement. Reckon the height in inches, using a tape measure. The fact that your child is above or under weight is all that is essential for parents to know. Every child that falls below 7 per cent

under weight deserves immediate attention.

Every mother knows the danger of infected adenoids and tonsils. If a child breathes through the mouth it is evidence of an obstruction that may in itself be sufficient cause for habitual underweight. If there is no obstruction in breathing and the record is unsatisfactory, special attention should be paid for the next four weeks to the most obvious health habits of the child as suggested in the following list:

Regular lunches daily at 10:30 a. m. and 3:30 p. m.
Regular daily rest periods, lying flat without pillow.

Limited exercise.
No music or study during the summer.
Make sure the child is eating well and has good food habits.
Interest your boys and girls in improving their health. Get them to be willing to train for health.
They should be weighed at the same hour weekly. This will interest them.
If they do not make satisfactory gain at the end of four weeks, consult a specialist.
