

TAX COLLECTORS WILL COME HERE

Negligence in Payment Is Alleged by Collector Milton A. Miller

The following statement is issued by the collector of internal revenue, Milton A. Miller:

"In this, as in every other section of the country, there will be conducted during the next two months an extensive tax drive for the collection of delinquent sales and other miscellaneous taxes, such as the so-called luxury tax, the soft drink tax, the admission tax, the manufacturer's tax, the tax on jewelry and works of art and the tax on toilet articles and proprietary medicines. Reports of laxity on the parts of dealers and other persons responsible for the return and collection of these taxes have reached the bureau of internal revenue from many sources.

"To remedy this condition a large force of revenue officers will be put in the field, and it is expected to result in the collection of millions of dollars in delinquent taxes.

"Information from the Sales unit of the bureau of internal revenue is that many dealers in soft drinks and ice cream either are keeping no record of the amount of tax collections from such sales, or that the record is insufficient or incorrect.

"Special attention will be directed to the collection of this tax as well as the tax on toilet articles and proprietary medicines. Through

the failure of retailers to collect in full the tax of one cent for each 25 cents or fraction thereof of the amount for which toilet articles and proprietary medicines are sold, it is estimated the government is losing several million dollars annually. The tax is collected by means of stamps ranging from one to forty cents, which the law provides shall be affixed by the dealer and cancelled.

"It is the intention to conduct as thorough and effective a campaign as possible in such a way as to bring to justice willful violators, and cause no embarrassment to merchants and business men who honestly are endeavoring to comply with the revenue laws."

LAST GRAIN CARGO GOES. PORTLAND, June 19.—The steel steamer West Selene, operated by the Pacific Mail Steamship company, has been assigned to carry the last cargo of United States grain corporation flour from the Columbia river to New York. It was made known here today.

Approximately 30,000 tons of flour remain to be shipped from Puget Sound before the administration closes up business in grain and flour which will have amounted to approximately \$180,000,000.

DEATH OF PET OF RING MOURNED

Spaniards Grieve for Famous Bull Fighter Who Meets End in Arena

LONDON, June 19.—The hackneyed argument against bullfighting, that the bull has not a sporting chance, is refuted by the death in Madrid of the idolized Joselito who was gored to death in the eighth year of his career, according to a correspondent writing to the London Times on "The Psychology of the Bull-Ring." He says:

"True that of the 1,450 bulls that Joselito disposed of in his brief career as a matador only seven succeeded in wounding his body and one taking his life.

"Yet, even if we accept these figures as an average, though they result from the experience of the most skillful bull-fighter that the Spaniards ring ever knew, they are amply sufficient to prove that the bull has a sporting chance considerably higher than that of the fox or deer.

"The opinion seems to be general in England that bullfights satisfy a craving for cruelty and sanguinary scenes. Nothing is farther from the truth. It is not because bullfights are sanguinary, but in spite of their being so, the Spaniards like them.

"It is seldom that the foreigner can appreciate a bullfight as something more complex and dramatic than a picture. Once he has taken in the graceful curve of the ring, the movement, the color, the merry hubbub of thousands of voices, and the blue sky overhead; once he has seen the despojo, the glistening costumes of the toreros, the quaint ceremony of the throwing of the key; once he has felt the first bull rush out from his dark cell, and then sudden stop, dazzled by the sun, cutting out on the yellow sand its beautiful

profile—nothing remains in store for him but monotony, broken now and then by outbursts of disgust. But it is true then that the true aficionado begins to enjoy himself.

"He is going to behold a spectacle where men are playing light-footed on the edge of the abyss. There is no forgetting that a bull is a most dangerous animal, one whose handling requires a cool head and a stout heart. And this is the fundamental fact about bull-fights. They are above all dramas of courage."

NEW YORK CITY MAY BE FIRST CITY IN WORLD

American Metropolis Will Probably Exceed London in Size When Compared

LATE GROWTH RAPID

Eight Million Persons Reside in and Around Huge Center According to Estimate

WASHINGTON, June 19.—Indications are that when the New York city census is announced it will show a total population larger than the last available figures for London. The race for largest city in the world however will be undecided until London's official census of 1921 is announced.

While no official intimation has been given as to the growth of New York during the last 10 years, as will be shown by the enumeration made in January, estimates of the city proper place the total population at about 6,100,000, and for the metropolitan district of New York, consisting of the city proper and the territory 10 miles from its boundaries, at about 8,200,000. These estimates are computed on the census bureau's method of arithmetical progression shown by experience to be nearer in accuracy in the majority of cases than any other formula. Statistics for the city proper will be the first given out; the figures for the metropolitan district will not be available until some time later.

London's population, according to the latest available statistics, which are estimates for 1917, give the population for registration London, the London for census purposes, as 4,026,901, and for Greater London, comprising the city and metropolitan police districts and covering a radius of 15 miles from Charing Cross, as 6,276,753.

Many factors have entered into the growth of both New York and London since the last official counts were taken. The war, officials here believe, has had its effect on the growth of both cities. New York is believed to have suffered from the stoppage of the stream of immigration, a large portion of which in previous years, has settled there. War industries are thought to have added to New York's population and also to a greater extent to that of London, where huge war plants were erected by the British government. London's losses of her men at the front were considerable and these are expected to affect her total population to some extent.

New York's metropolitan district, as shown by returns of 22 New Jersey cities and towns whose populations already have been announced, will not show so heavy a growth as it did in the decade ending with 1910. These cities and towns, including Newark, Paterson and Jersey City, show an increase only four-fifths as large as was shown 10 years ago.

Fair comparison of the population of the world's two largest cities is difficult. Census bureau officials declare, owing to the areas covered by the various designations.

New York city proper, composed of the boroughs of the Bronx, Brooklyn, Manhattan, Queens and Richmond, covers about 287 square miles. Its population in 1910 was 4,766,883. The metropolitan district of New York, comprising territory within 10

miles of the city boundaries, including all incorporated places, half of whose area lies within the limit or half of whose population resides within the limit, covers about 964 square miles. The population of this metropolitan district was 6,474,568 in 1910.

The city of London, within municipal and parliamentary limits, has an area of 655 acres, a little more than a square mile, and in 1911 had a night population of 19,657, and a day, or working population of more than 1,000,000. The administrative county of London, known as Inner London, is composed of the city and county of London, and is described as the London for census purposes. It has an area of about 116 square miles and had a population in 1911 of 4,521,657. This population showed a decrease of almost half a million people in the estimate made in 1917.

Greater London, comprising the administrative county of London and the outer ring area covered by the city and metropolitan police districts, extends to a radius of 15 miles from Charing Cross. It has an area of about 693 square miles and its population in the official census of 1911 was 7,251,258. Its estimated population in 1917 was 6,726,852.

Scores of Local Fans to See Woodburn Game

Schroeder played with the locals during spring practice and the Senators declare that his warts won't fade them in the least, and they expect the old wrecking crew to get enough hits off his delivery to get that "hit or run" that wins ball games.

A goodly number of dyed-in-the-wool Salem fans will accompany the team and claim that the Woodburn routers won't have things all their own way.

Fare Patrol Promised Polk County Forests

DALLAS, Or., June 19.—(Special to The Statesman)—W. V. Fuller, Polk county fire patrol warden, has been busy this week with large forces of men preparing the trails and repairing the telephone lines through the timbered section of Polk county and getting things ready for the forest fire season that will soon be here.

A number of patrolmen have already been placed on duty and within the next few days several more will be added to the list. Among those who entered the employ of the fire warden's office this week was T. C. Stockwell, a wireless operator who will have charge of the Bald Peak station. Mr. Stockwell will have charge of the wireless plant there to take messages from aviators who have located fires in this territory and he will then phone the location to other fire patrolmen scattered throughout the country.

Last year there were but few fires in Polk county and it is Mr. Fuller's intention to reduce the number this year which he believes can be done with the excellent service as outlined by him so far.

Farmers' Union Holds Annual Picnic at Dallas

DALLAS, Or., June 19.—(Special to The Statesman)—One of the largest crowds ever assembled in this city gathered Thursday to attend the annual picnic of the Polk County Farmers' union. The exercises began at 10 o'clock in the morning with a concert by the Dallas band. A program followed, consisting of musical and recital selections. Prominent among the speakers of the day were A. R. Shumway, state president of the Farmers' union, and Walter M. Pierce, member of the state senate.

In the afternoon sport contests were held. A ball game between Dallas and Falls City resulted in a victory for the Falls City players by a score of 2 to 1. The game was one of the best ever played here. The exercises of the day ended late at night with a dance at the Woodman hall.

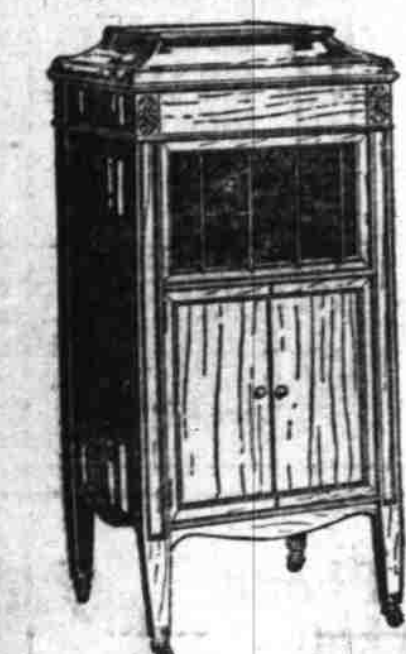

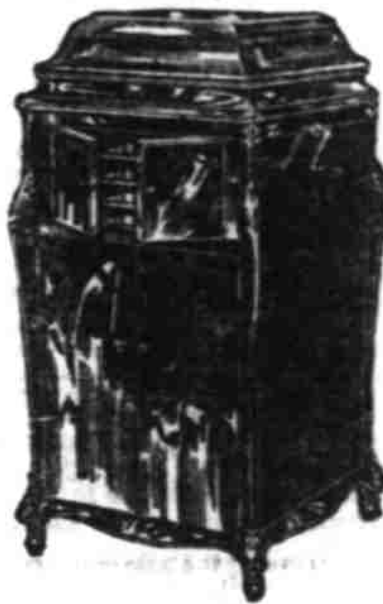

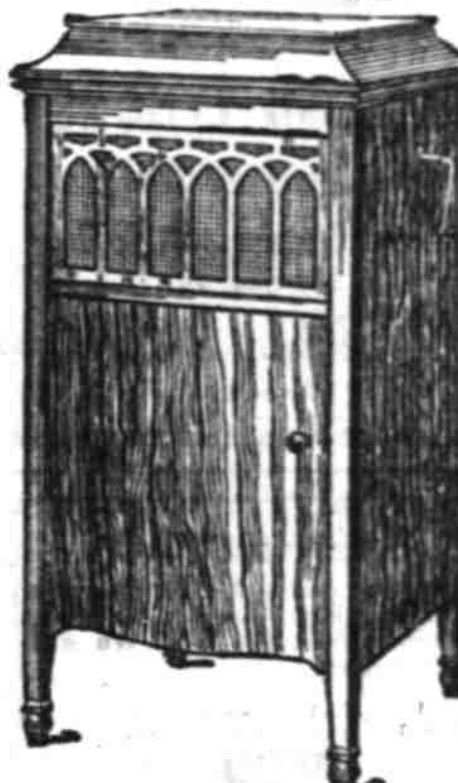
