## JACK HAYES BRIGHT STAR OF SENATORS

### Two Home Runs Made by Swift Player—Cole Twirls Marvelous Game

### SALEM BEATS WOODBURN

### Big Things Promised for Next Meeting of Two Teams

The "Babe Ruthing" stunts of Jack Hayes together with the superb twirling of Cole brought a well earned victory to the Salem Senators and inglorious defeat to the Woodburn Tigers at Woodburn last Sunday afternoon.

Jack Hayes stepped up to the plate in the first inning with Bishop and Proctor on the bags and rung the bell thrice by clouting the ball over the right field fence. In the third inning, his second trip to the plate, he greeted the Woodburn twirler with his second circuit smash on the first pitched ball, and fortunately for Woodburn there were no men on the bases, Hayes' home run being the only tally registered that inning. He was thrown out at a third base on a questionable decision in the eighth inning when he sought to stretch a double into a triple. Jack gathered four hits out of five trips to the plate.

It must have been the newly-weds day, for Bishop registered a home-run in the seventh making the fourth drive over the fence for the day, the third being made by Whitman of the opposing team.

Due to the heavy hitting of the Senators, the game was unusually long, lasting over two hours. Outside of the fifth inning when the local boys eased up a little and permitted a few grounders to trickle between their legs, enabling the Tigers to score four runs, they had their own way. In that inning the Woodburn team came within two of tying the score. Cole pitched air tight ball whiffing 12 men.

Woodburn used two pitchers, Pendleton and DeGeer. The former was given the "hook" in the fourth inning. DeGeer being moved to the slab from the outfield and Beebe was called from the bench to take his place in left field. Being an older man than Pendleton, DeGeer has more control and was cooler in the pinches. Other than that he had little on the ball that proved puzzling to the Salem men, for as many runs were garnered off his delivery as from Pendleton.

Each game finds the Senators playing airtight ball and hitting the pill at a 400 clip. In this regard they resemble that thing of antiquity—wine; for they seem to improve with age. So when Woodburn invaded the Salem camp in the near future a royal battle is assured the local fans.

"Wait until we come to Salem" was a common remark of the Woodburn boosters, and if it was offered in a spirit of revenge, the next game between these two teams will be an exciting affair.

A game for June 27 has been announced by Bishop with the Vancouver, Washington, team.
