DR. O. B. MILES

PASSES AWAY

Well Known Salem Physician

and Former Educator Succumbs at Farm Home

Death claimed one of the best known physicians in the city for the last 14 years, when Dr. Ola Burton Miles, passed away at his country home "The Ranch," five miles south of Salem at 12:35 o'clock Sunday morning.

Dr. Miles had been in poor health for the past year and some time ago was compelled because of ill health to retire from his office. It is thought that the break in his health was a result of his unceasing work during the first serious influenza epidemic in Salem. However he had partially regained his health and the announcement of his passing comes as a shock to his wide circle of friends.

Dr. Miles had been a resident of Salem for 28 years and had taken an active part in the civic life of the city. For several years he filled the offices of city physician and school physician of Salem, and county physician for a number of years.

Dr. Miles was born of Quaker parents, at Salem, Henry county, Ia., February 21, 1872. He moved from Iowa to Mississippi in 1873 and from that state to Kansas in 1878 where he grew to manhood. He attended the public schools in Kansas and graduated from the St. Johns high school in 1890. For several years he taught school in the rural districts in Kansas. With his family he moved to Salem, Or., in 1892. For seven years he intermittently attended and taught school. In this county and in Wheeler county where he was the first county school superintendent. He was married to Miss Olivia Blanch Jory, October 9, 1897.

He entered Willamette Medical college in 1902 and graduated as the president of his class in 1905. He practiced medicine at Independence and at Gervais before opening his office in this city. For some years he was a lecturer in the Willamette Medical college. He was a member of the American Medical association.

Dr. Miles is survived by his widow, and one daughter, Miss Jessie Miles, a student at the University of Oregon; his mother, Mrs. Ruth W. Miles, and three brothers, A. C. Miles and Walter J. Miles of Sacramento, Cal., and T. W. Miles of Medford also survive him.

He was a member of the Moose lodge, the Foresters and the Modern Woodmen of America. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Webb & Clough chapel, Rev. R. N. Avison and Rev. H. E. Pemberton will conduct the services. The body will be laid to rest in Mount Crest Abbey mausoleum.
