Resolution by Council

Annexation of the state fair grounds, which was voted by the people of Salem at the special election May 21, is now an actuality, the council last night having adopted the resolution which makes the act effective.

At the council meeting last night Mayor Wilson's proclamation was read, declaring the results of the election, showing among other things that George E. Halvorsen was elected mayor, Earl Race elected city recorder, C. O. Rice elected city treasurer and Vernon Moffitt and J. T. Welsh nominated for chief of police the election of chief to take place in November.
