

Non Partisan League Wins in Minnesota

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 22.—Gradually reducing the early lead established by J. A. O. Preus in the contest for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, Dr. Henrik Shipstead, the Nonpartisan league candidate, had cut down the margin separating them to 15,000 in returns available tonight from yesterday's statewide primary election.

Assassins Victorious Say British Unionists

LONDON, June 22.—Moving the adjournment of the house of commons for the purpose of calling attention to the rioting in London, Lieut. Colonel Wilfrid Ashley, unionist, declared today that victory rested with the assassins, and not with the government, which appeared powerless to maintain the sanctity of life.

Water Supply Increased

MADRID, June 22.—A slight increase in the amount of water available this afternoon has somewhat diminished the waiting lines. The authorities have announced the repair of the principal part of the damage to the water conduit, thus permitting the filling of reservoirs to be resumed.

QUANTICO, Va., June 22.—Five civilians led the fifty expert pistol shots including marksmen of the army, navy and marine corps who competed here today for places on the five man team which will represent the United States in the Olympic games. Shooting was at 50 metre range.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 22.—With Afti temple Shrine band of Tacoma and the Al Azhar band of Calgary, Alberta, playing patriotic airs, the Antinous, 5600-ton freighter built for the Green Star line of New York by the G. M. Standifer construction corporation, was launched here today.

PORTLAND, Or., June 22.—The men owning hat check concessions in Portland cafes will not reap the reward they all anticipated during the Shrine procession here. Fehrenbach Cabinet Falls

LONDON, June 22.—The Fehrenbach cabinet has collapsed owing to the majority socialists refusing to support it. This announcement is made in a dispatch from Berlin to the London Times sent last night.

Silver Drop Hits China

SHANGHAI, June 22.—Owing to the drop in silver, Chinese importers are threatened with a loss of 60,000,000 taels during the fiscal year if the current exchange rate continues. This is the estimate of the importers' association, which is appealing to the British and American chambers for aid and an extension of pending contracts, the fulfillment of which would mean possibly widespread bankruptcy.

Seeds May Advance

MILWAUKEE, June 22.—Recommendations for a slight increase in the price of seeds was made by E. C. Dugan, Philadelphia, president in his annual report at the opening session of the convention of the American seed trade association today.

Rioters Quiet

WATERBURY, Conn., June 22.—In spite of the nervous tension following the riot Monday in which one striker was killed and two police lieutenants were seriously wounded, Waterbury was quiet today, there being no renewed outbreaks precipitated by the strike.

Nonpartisan Chosen

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 22.—Burnton K. Wheeler of Butte was nominated for governor by the state Nonpartisan league convention here today and R. G. Arnold of Valley county was named for lieutenant-governor.

Riots Over Say Police

CHICAGO, June 22.—Confident that all danger of rioting had passed, Chief of Police Garrity tonight ordered withdrawal of extra police details from the south side "black belt" where two white men were killed Sunday night following a parade of "Abyssinian princes" and the burning of a flag.

Expect G. O. P. Victory

NEW YORK, June 22.—Predicting a republican victory in November and the election of Senator Harding whom he compared to former President McKinley and Hayes, Myron T. Herrick, former ambassador to France, sailed for Paris today where he will attend the convention of the international chamber of commerce.

Food Riots in Germany

BERLIN, June 22.—Riotous demonstrations against the high prices of food in which many persons were wounded in clashes with the police, are reported from Osnabrueck, province of Hanover, from Crefeld, in the Rhine province and from Frankfurt-on-Main.

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School Board Jailed

CHICAGO, June 22.—Nine members of the Chicago school board and their attorney were found guilty of contempt of court by Judge Kikkham Scanlan today and seven were sentenced to short jail terms, while all drew fines ranging from \$20 to \$750. All the defendants appealed.

Six Indictments Turned In

NEW YORK, June 22.—The extraordinary grand jury which has been considering charges and counter charges growing out of the "vice war" between the police department and the New York district attorney's office, tonight returned six indictments charging misdemeanors against persons whose names court officials refused to divulge.

Plague Breaks Out in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, June 22.—Yellow fever is believed to have broken out in Vera Cruz where many cases of bubonic plague were reported recently, according to newspaper dispatches received today.

Dr. Derby Given Medal

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Dr. Richard Derby, son in law of the late Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, has been awarded a distinguished service medal, the war department announced today, for his services with the army medical corps in France. Dr. Derby held the rank of lieutenant colonel in the Second division.

Boilermakers Return

ST. LOUIS, June 22.—A five-weeks' strike of boilermakers in 14 plants here was ended today, the employers granting the demands of the strikers for "closed shop" operation and a 15 per cent wage increase.

Organist Honored

BERLIN, Ohio, June 22.—Victor Baier, organist of Trinity church, New York, was elected warden of the American guild of Organists, assembled in third annual convention here today. Recitals were given by Eric Delmarer of Chicago, assistant director of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, and Charles M. Courboin of Philadelphia. About 100 delegates are attending the convention, which closes Thursday.

Switchmen Refuse to Strike

SCRANTON, Pa., June 22.—The switchmen employed by the Delaware Lackawanna & Western railroad in this city will not go out on strike in sympathy with strikers on other divisions. This was determined at a meeting tonight.

Sweden and Finland Advised

LONDON, June 22.—The London Times announces it has reasons to believe that representations have been addressed to the Swedish and Finnish governments on behalf of the allied and associated powers to the effect that Sweden and Finland should refer the question of the sovereignty of the Aland islands to the league of nations.

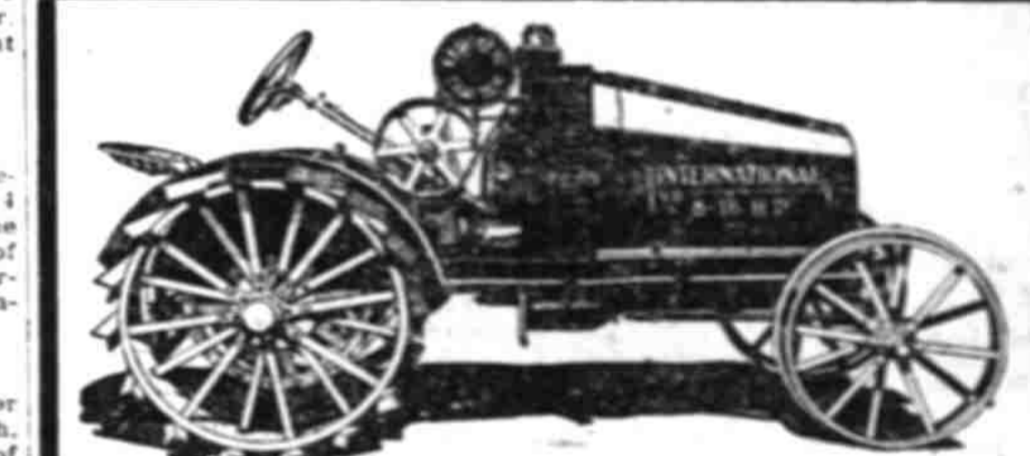

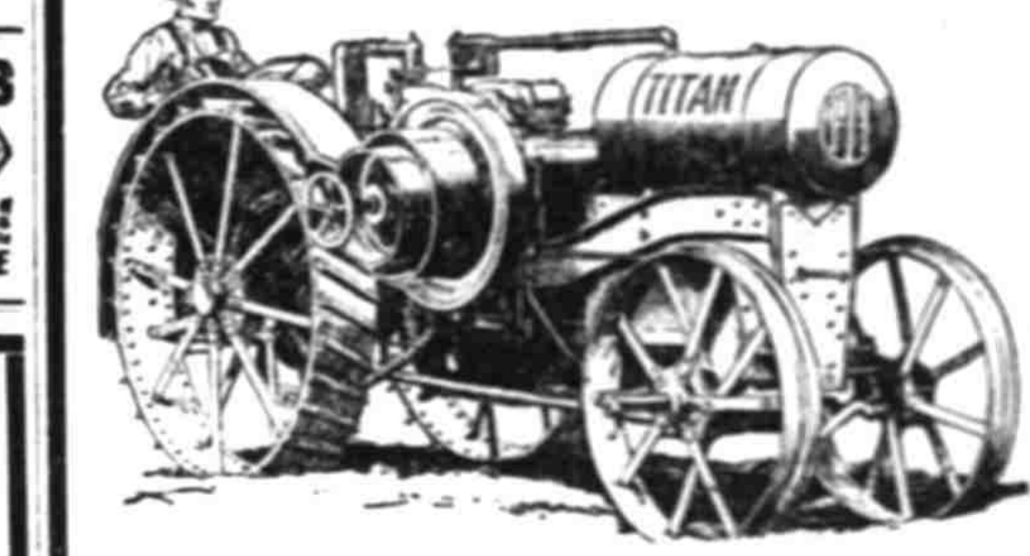
