The drivers are instructed not to go faster than 20 miles an hour and not to pass any other car in the caravan unless it is disabled. To leave the caravan for side trips, either coming from or returning to Portland is forbidden.

If the weather permits the drivers will travel with tops down so the passengers may have the best view of the Willamette valley. Upon arrival in Salem the automobiles will discharge their passengers on Court street.

Lunches Prepared—Only one hour will be spent in Salem. But in that period all the visitors will be provided with luncheon, prepared by hundreds of local women who worked at the Salem churches yesterday. One hundred girls from the Y.W.C.A. will distribute the lunches. This will take place in Willson park. Pies and Loju also will be provided for the visitors.

Another group of girls will see to it that each visitor has a Salem rose pinned on the lapel of his coat, and all Salem people who have roses to spare are requested to take them to Willson park not later than 9 o'clock this morning.

The cars will re-load on State street and return to Portland by the River road, St. Paul and Newberg, re-entering Portland over Terwilliger boulevard.

Aside from the cars in the excursion procession parking will not be permitted in the unloading and loading district and police officers will be on hand to enforce this regulation.
