

TWELVE CENTS AVERAGE PRICE

Berry Lots in Vicinity of Salem Are Gradually Being Disposed of

As the end of the contract season for loganberries and cherries approaches, taking a broad average, the price stands at 12 cents. The activities of the various cherry and loganberry buyers indicate that Salem and vicinity will have an unusually attractive crop.

The exact amount is that being paid by the buyers is a matter of conjecture. The growers are equally as secretive in regard to the prices. "Mum" seems to be the word they have adopted for their own protection.

Each is sensitive in reference to price publicity.

Several pools have recently been sold at good prices according to reports. The Bruce Cunningham holding of about 200 tons has been disposed of at 13 cents. Other parcels of 15 and 100 tons have been disposed of, according to reliable reports, for the price of 12½ cents.

Mr. Cunningham stated recently that the formation of the Marion berry pool was instrumental in raising the present price of berries. This is favorable to the small grower. He further asserts that he had personally offered 14 cents for his crop of berries, but that he ignored the offer because it did not consider the interest of the small growers who are members of the pool.

However, Mr. Cunningham claims that the members of the pool were forced to accept a price less than the 14 cents because of the sugar situation which he claims was utilized by buyers in breaking the lower figure. Regardless of this fall in price, some

local buyers claim that the prices of 12 and 13 cents are the highest average scales ever attained in Oregon.

The prices of cherries are also keeping step with the march of the logans. Several pools have recently been sold near the 13 cent mark. The Kurtz plant, the Oregon Packing company and the Rupert company are reported to have received the largest turnovers from the pools.

ALFALFA WILL MAKE PAPER

PITTSBURGH, June 22.—Alfalfa mixed with certain organic chemicals will produce a serviceable grade of newspaper paper, according to J. Clark of Boston, representative of a paper manufacturing concern, who addressed a meeting of the Pittsburgh advertising club here today. Speaking of the newspaper shortage, Mr. Clark said that alfalfa would be the most likely substitute for wood pulp, because of the great supply, but he added that corn stalks and grass could be used if necessary.

**Father of Prohibition
Loses Re-nomination**

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 22.—Congressman A. J. Volstead, Republican, author of the prohibition enforcement act was defeated for re-nomination in yesterday's primary by the ex. O. J. Kvale of Benson. Non-partisan league candidate, on virtually complete returns tonight.

which an incumbent seeking re-nomination was unsuccessful, almost overshadowed the unusually close race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

J. A. O. Preus, state auditor, still had a lead of 15,000 votes in the gubernatorial race over Dr. Henrik Shipstead, non-partisan league candidate, when returns had been tabulated from more than 2,500 of the 3,195 precincts in the state.

Returns from 2645 precincts out of 3,195 in the state gave Preus 124,956 and Shipstead 109,845. In the seventh congressional district 321 precincts out of 375 gave Kvale 13,498 and Volstead 12,802.

Reverend Kvale is a pastor of the Norwegian Lutheran church and is 52 years old. He has been a clergyman for 26 years. In connection with Volstead's authorship of the prohibition act, it was pointed out by friends of Kvale here tonight that he had advocated absolute prohibition for more than a score of years. He became a minister in Wisconsin, but moved to Minnesota several years ago.

Two years ago Congressman Volstead was opposed for re-nomination by Dr. Shipstead, now seeking gubernatorial honors.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 22.—Miss Elly Hope Anderson of this city declared tonight she had not yet received a message from District Attorney Swann of New York asking her to come to that city to be questioned in connection with the J. B. Elwell murder mystery. She stated, however, that she would be willing to go to New York if asked, as stated in New York dispatches.

"I shall be glad to tell the authorities all I know," declared Miss Anderson, and give them all the help I can."

Miss Anderson said she had breakfast with Victor Von Schlegel, New York businessman, about 8 a.m. on June 11, the date on which Elwell was found dead. She said she had had dinner with Von Schlegel the night before. At the dinner she last saw Elwell, she asserted.

"The encounter of Mr. Von Schlegel and myself with Mr. Elwell was wholly accidental," she said. She declared she knew "absolutely nothing that could throw any light" on Elwell's slaying.

MAINE NOMINATES GOVERNOR.

PORTLAND, Me., June 22.—The nomination of Frederick H. Parkhurst of Bangor for governor on

the Republican ticket at yesterday's primary was assured with the completion tonight of a tabulation of revised returns from the whole state except 22 small towns which cast only 868 votes at the last state election. With these places missing, his plurality over John P. Deering was 2448, the vote being: Parkhurst, 19,121; Deering, 16,273; Governor Carl Milliken, 13,139; Louis A. Jack, 1755.

Unofficial returns in the first districts give Carroll L. Beedy of Portland the Republican nomination for congress by a plurality of 19 votes over Mayor C. B. Clarke of Portland.

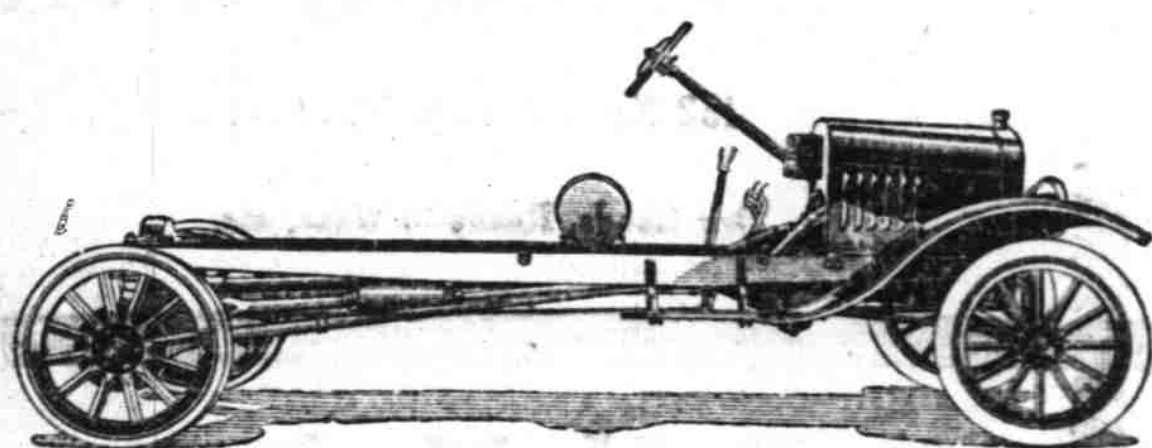
