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PRISON AWAITS ROBERT ZULLIG

Man Convicted of Killing Wife Ruled Against by State Supreme Court

Robert Zullig of Lake county, who, on a charge of slaying his wife, Emma Zullig, was indicted for murder in the second degree and convicted of manslaughter, must go to the penitentiary to serve from 7 1/2 to 15 years. The supreme court yesterday, in an opinion by Justice Bennett, affirms the lower court for Lake county, Judge L. F. Conn.

All the evidence leading to the conviction of Zullig was circumstantial. The defense in appealing to the supreme court claimed error on fusing to direct a verdict, and in refusing to set aside the verdict when given and grant a new trial. Justice Bennett refuses to uphold this contention of the defense.

Other opinions were: Minda S. Blatter, appellant, vs. G. G. Cross and James S. McCallum, cross appellants, and Nancy J. Shelley et al, appeal from Lane county; petitions for rehearing on behalf of appellant and cross-appellant denied by Justice Bennett and former opinion modified relative to distribution of any amount received from foreclosures if there shall be a foreclosure.

H. M. McFarland vs. John H. Hueters, appellant; appeal from Jackson county; action to recover money; opinion by Justice Bennett. Judge F. M. Calkins affirmed. Petitions for rehearing denied in Pacific Livestock & Lumber company vs. Portland Lumber company et al, and in Whetstone vs. Jensen.

Stolen Car Left in Farmer's Yard

F. A. Torgensen, who resides five and a half miles south of Independence on the Corvallis road, was aroused at 1 o'clock last Sunday morning by the obstreperousness of a group of boys in his front yard.

When asked what they wanted, the boys claimed that they had a flat tire and were out of gasoline and that they would desire permission to leave their car in his yard until the next day. Mr. Torgensen gave them such permission and they left the car.

After a couple of days had elapsed and no one came to reclaim the car, Mr. Torgensen became suspicious for the car was still in his back yard. The matter was reported to the police and upon investigation it was discovered that the car was the property of Clyde Mason. The identity of the boys is unknown to the police as Mr. Torgensen was unable to give a description of them.

Alternative Writ Issued in Sand and Gravel Case

The supreme court yesterday issued an alternative writ of mandamus requiring the state land board to appear July 2 and show cause why a contract should not be entered into with the Salem Sand & Gravel company to extract material from the bed of the Willamette river, with a royalty payment of 3 cents a cubic yard to the state. The board has fixed a minimum royalty of 10 cents and refuses to deviate from the ruling, while the sand and gravel company contends that under the law enacted at the special session of the legislature last January under which the beds of streams are leased, the state must lease to the highest bidder. Original action in mandamus was instituted in the supreme court by the sand and gravel company.
