Fair Grounds Campers Robbed During Night

E. L. Sutton of Phoenix, Ariz., and C. E. Madson of Gilbert, Ariz., place the responsibility upon the Oregon climate for the loss of \$50 and \$45 in currency Tuesday evening while camping out at the fair grounds. They said their sleep was so sound the intrusit of the robber during the night was not detected by them.

When Mr. Sutton retired for the night he left his tent wide open so

that he might have the benefit of fresh air. He left his purse containing \$50 in his trousers pocket, together with some important papers. When he awoke next morning he discovered the disappearance of his trousers, together with his valuables, which included the money, papers and a nickel watch of Elgin movement. The thief retained the trousers.

His fellow camper, Mr. Madson, who occupied a separate tent alongside, also experienced similar loss. However, the thief did not take his trousers, being content only to empty the pocket of his wallet of \$65 and to throw the clothing between the tents.

Mrs. Frances A. McIntosh, mother of Miss Alice A. McIntosh, an instructor at Oregon Normal school at Monmouth, died there yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Mrs. McIntosh had been in Monmouth since November when she came from her home in Oconomowoc, Wis., to visit her daughter. She was 75 years old. Besides Miss Alice McIntosh she leaves another daughter, Mrs. A. C. Hathaway of Milwaukee, Wis.
