**Water Applications**—Applications for permits to appropriate water have been filed with Percy A. Cupper, state engineer, by the C. & O. Lumber company of Brookings, Curry county, which desires to use 2 1/2 second feet of water from Joe Hall creek for manufacturing lumber and as a domestic supply for the town of Brookings. A flume 4 1/2 miles long is to be constructed at an estimated cost of \$14,000. Other applications have been filed as follows: By Olvin and Kenneth Thompson of Hampton, Or., covering the construction of Desert Creek reservoirs Nos. 1 and 2, for the storage of 15 acre feet of water, and for the appropriation of the stored water together with the water from Desert creek for the irrigation of 100 acres in Crook county. By Turner Oliver of Spokane, covering the appropriation of three second feet of water from the Grande Ronde river for the irrigation of 220 acres in Union county. By John H. Groves of Ashland, covering the appropriation of water from Tyler creek for the irrigation of 10 acres in Jackson county.
