

SNATCHED FROM PRISON

Slayer Brought to Salem When Order Signed by Governor Is Shown

By a narrow margin of a few minutes Governor Olcott, through an arder of reprieve signed in Portland Thursday, saved W. H. Butler, under indeterminate sentence of from one to 15 years in the state penitentiary for the slaying of McDonald Stewart of Jackson county, from entering the prison yesterday to start serving his

Butler, who is about 55 years old, is a native of Oregon and at the time of the slaying of Stewart on October 29, 1917, owned a large ranch in the vicinity of Eagle Point. It was alleged at the time of Butler's trial in the circuit court for Jackson county that several persons had made property, and that upon one occasion camplaint had been filed with the officers that the defendant had pur-

The case was argued before the supreme court in May, 1918, and on becember 23, 1919, an opinion was handed down affirming the judgment of the lower court. Justice Benson concurred in the result, but dissented in his review of some of the minor matters in the case. Justice Harris wrote a special opinion, in which he concurred in the main with Justice Bennett. Justice Johns concurred in the opinion written by Justice Harris. Justice Burnett dissent-
