

## SENATORS WHIP VANCOUVER TEAM

Score is Two to One in Rattling Good Game at Oxford Field Sunday

The enemy came, they saw, but they did not conquer. The Salem Senators won a close game from the Vancouver team by a score of 2 to 1 Sunday afternoon at Oxford park.

It was a game of the high-water mark kind as only four errors were charged to the contesting teams. Vancouver being guilty of three and the lone error charged to Salem was committed by the redoubtable "Kin" Cole in his anxiety to retrieve a hard hit ball. However, for this mar on his escutcheon he redeemed himself beyond a reasonable doubt. He whiffed only 11 of the visitors and let them down with only five bingles, generously scattered throughout the game.

The Senators started the game in the first inning with their characteristic vim by ornamenting the bags with dancing and over-anxious Senators. Hayes and Kracke are two good hitters, but no batter great and renowned though he may be, will function in a pinch if he approaches the plate overflowing with anxiety. It unsteadies the serves of the best. Such was the lot of Hayes and Kracke, for they met the fate of "Casey" of old—they struck out at the crucial moment and Salem did not score.

Although the Senators garnered seven hits and had little trouble hitting Mohler, the Vancouver pitcher, they failed to hit when hits meant runs. That is often the case when two good teams meet, their strongest defense is exerted when the impending moments are crucial.

While the Vancouver outfielders were rehearsing the "Let Me Do It" George Stunt in the outer gardens in the second inning, Blanchard scored on Bishop's fly to center. This lack of organization proved to be

the undoing of Vancouver for it put Salem in the lead. Vancouver made its lone score in the sixth inning, coming in on Ostenson's clout. Salem made its winning run in the next inning when Billy Stepp registered a tally on Bishop's hit to Bither. Thus ended the chapter in the winning streak of the Senators.
