WIDOW SEEKS TO GET ALLOWANCE

Mrs. Herbert Winslow Plaintiff in Action to Force State Compensation

The supreme court yesterday heard arguments in the madamam case brought by Mrs. Herbert Winslow of Salem and Mrs. Fannie West of Portland to compel the state industrial accident commission to pay them allowances for the month of June under the workmen's compensation act.

The suit was filed following the refusal of the accident commission to pay to Mrs. Winslow and Mrs. West further allowances until such time as the legal authority of the commission had been determined by the courts. This action was taken by the commission after the supreme court of the state of New York had given an opinion in which it was held that the accident commission of that state was without authority to settle or pay claims in admiralty. Mr. Winslow was drowned while in charge of a ferry plying the Willamette river between Salem and Polk county, while Mr. West was killed while employed in fitting out a completed hull in one of the Portland shipyards.

DEAF MUTE HELD FAKIR BY POLICE

Alms-Seeker Hears When Presented With Money by Charitable Persons

Because the person begging, who feigned deafness, was able to hear some things and not others, the residents of the neighborhood of 1116 Mill street, became suspicious and reported to the police of his alms-seeking. He is described as a man about 50 years of age, of a dark complexion and appeared to be a foreigner. He wore a pair of dirty overalls and a faint brown hat. He is alleged to have approached the house and to feign deafness, although when he heard that he was going to be reported, he made his get-away by going south on the Southern Pacific tracks. Those who reported the case to the police say that the culprit entered a house on 1116 Mill street and a few minutes later was seen to emerge from the house. The residents of the house were away at the time. When the owners of the house returned in the evening they discovered a loss of \$1.50 which had been taken from the pantry. No other loss was reported yesterday.

Cecil Proctor, Paul Waddell and Robert McLean, all 13 years of age, were arrested here last night and are being held pending the arrival of their parents from Portland. Reports reaching the police indicate that the boys left their homes without informing their parents and made their way here on a freight train. Proctor was found to be in possession of \$84 of a total of \$120 which he is alleged to have stolen from his father before starting out to see the world.

Corvallis Woman Would Recover for Livestock

Minnie L. Miller of Corvallis yesterday filed a complaint against William Benish seeking judgment against him for an alleged debt incurred from the purchase of some livestock from her six years ago. She alleges that the defendant purchas-

ed three milk cows, one heifer and three calves from her at that time for the consideration of \$215. He paid, she asserts in her complaint, \$100. But he has failed to date to pay the remainder of \$115. Now she asks for principal plus interest totaling \$156.25 together with the cost of court disbursements.
