Three Contests Slated Between Salem Senators and Kirkpatrick Hustlers

No careful study is required, nor does it take a prophet or the son of a prophet to forecast that the coming baseball series of three days, July 3, 4 and 5, between the Kirkpatrick team of Portland and the Salem Senators will be hotly contested.

We know of the achievements of the Senators: their recent games have ended in victories for them. All of this give us the assurance that a good team is required to defeat them. The rough spots, so evident in the earlier games, have been smoothed off until their playing is now marked with the precision of veterans.

Also the weather man predicts hot days for the series, and hot days are

what unlimbers the "soup bones" of the has-beens and the near has-beens. If the Senators have been on their roster they must be of the sturdy and robust type, for all of the players are dangerous with the "willow" at all times.

Jack Hayes, the fence-buster of the local team, and Kracke, the peppy backstop, are nursing a good-sized grudge against the pellet for whiffing in last Sunday's game at the crucial moment when the buns were buzzing with Senators. We be unto the horseshoe that dares to sail over the groove of the home-plate in the coming series. They are in a mood to redeem themselves and to "come through" when a hit means a run.

Dark horses are much in the limelight these days, political conventions have made them popular. Biddy Bishop, the manager of the Salem team, is to popularize it in the baseball world. He says that he has a dark horse to introduce in the coming series to Salem people. His dark horse, he claims, has the real "stuff." He did not divulge in what capacity his "find" would serve.

Rumor floats on the current of comment that the International Pacific league is on the rocks and will

disband soon. The exodus of the players from this league will mark the genesis of better brand of ball in this neck of the woods. Rumor has it that some of the northern leaguers have expressed intentions to come and join teams in Portland and the Willamette valley for the rest of the baseball season, and it may be that Bishop's dark horse is a real leaguer. Suffice it to say he has something good in store for the fans.

The Kirkpatrick have been mowing down their opponents in Portland with an eight-day clock regularity. They are among the best teams obtainable in the Rose City. They come to Salem prepared to throw a monkey wrench and other hardware implements into the well-oiled machinery of the local lads. They come, according to advance information, prepared to meet the worst in baseball parlance, this means they are "loaded to the guards."

It is said that the Kirkpatrick received a "tip" that Salem baseball "bugs" are willing to support their team with money, marble or chalk, or just plain "hot air." It is, therefore, probable that some loose change will be floating around in the air at the grounds during Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Nothing would please them more than to cart back some Salem money; nothing will please Salemites more than to make a "killing."

In view of these facts, local baseball enthusiasts are destined to witness some air-tight playing, metaphorically speaking some blood-spilling out at Oxford park during the coming series. Both teams are now ready with "blood in their eyes" and with sharpened fangs eager to fly at each other. The magic word of "play ball" by the umpire will start the fireworks.

Uproar Is General.

When Governor Cox was named. It was the turn of the Cox supporters and they came to the task with will. Again more than half an hour was given over to the uproar and singing, to the parading of state standards, led by Ohio and Kentucky. Yells given with the barking note of football rooters came down from the Ohio section in the gallery. The Ohio band never paused. Again and again it drew new cheers from the audience. Delegates with the strains of "Dixie" or sought and found men of Irish descent with the "Wearing of the Green."

It took much effort by Governor Cox's managers to still the uproar and let the business of nomination proceed. Chairman Robinson pounded unceasingly with his gavel when more than half an hour had passed, and finally the rooters fought their way back to the gallery and the

delegates back to their seats, to await the next act.

Popular Note Struck. Senator Harrison of Mississippi, among these seconding Governor Cox's nomination, struck a note that proved the convention had been keyed up. He hit hard at the newspapers of San Francisco which published the story of the governor's divorce ten years ago, and a burst of cheers that rang out answered his thrust.

Then Chairman Robinson recognized W. Bourke Cochran of New York, to nominate Governor Smith. As he came to the platform the delegates greeted him as an old friend.

The New Yorker struck a note from the first that found a quick answer. Cochran lavished unstinted admiration on President Wilson. Nearly every word and gesture brought cheers and shouts from the floor and Cochran's tribute to Governor Smith set the New York delegation going with American flags and much cheering.

The demonstration started slowly. Cochran made his way through admirers on the platform. On the divorce back with his own delegation, he was accorded a vigorous reception. New Jersey folks came over to join in.

Then the bandmaster, far up in his gallery, had an inspiration. Previously he had been playing "Tammany" over and over again, in recognition of the New York delegation, but now the strains of "The Side-walks of New York" came down from the raft. The big organ took up the homely old tune of 25 years ago. It was too much for the crowd.

Throughout the hall gray-haired men and women began to sing, stirred by strains that harked them back to their days of youth. A Jerseyite seized his state standard and marched across to the New York stand and again the march was on, the band played "Rosie O'Grady," "The Bowery," "After the Ball" and a dozen other old-timers.

Palmer Banners Cheered. Palmer banners, Cox hat bands and tokens of other candidates were mingled in the throng without regard to the affiliation. It seemed as though the whole convention had come singing mad. Men and women, old and young, they surged along laughing and singing the old songs until every state standard had joined in the grotesque line.

Gradually the cheering subsided and the convention went back to nominating speeches.

FIGHT WAGED AGAINST RADICAL WET PLANK

picked to carry the administration's guidance in the committee fight, with Mr. Bryan and Senator Walsh of Montana; Walsh of Massachusetts, and Pomerene of Ohio, the shock troops of the opposition.

The Montana senator stood out in the sub-committee for approval of reservations "consistent with the honor and good faith of the United States" and to advise co-operation with Republican senators friendly to the treaty with a view to early ratification. Senator Walsh of Massachusetts tonight made public another league plank, commending the president for his efforts for the league, desiring "ratification" but "without nullifying change," but for "reservations making clearer or more specific the obligations of the United States," and denouncing any movement to make it a partisan issue.

Labor Plank Injected. Senator Pomerene also had before the full committee a plank, urging ratification without impairing reservations, but harmonizing of differences on reservations if necessary. Senators who voted for the Lodge reservations also were demanding that their action be not repudiated. The Irish question was another militant proposition. Prominent leaders said the plank fostered by Frank P. Walsh and Eamonn Valera for recognition of the "Irish republic" had virtually no chance, but widespread influences were working to secure some adequate and generally satisfactory expression of sympathy with Irish aspirations.

Among important planks placed in the tentative platform by the sub-committee were those dealing with Mexico and industrial relations. The labor plank fully recognizes the right of collective bargaining and representation of labor by its own spokesmen.

All of the sub-committee's decision, Chairman Glass said tonight, were tentative.
