Land to Be Exchanged—

The state land board yesterday decided to exchange 50,000 acres of what is known as state script, and which is located in various sections of Oregon, for a compact body of 50,000 acres of federal lands in the Santiam forest reserve. If the exchange is made as proposed by the board the lands acquired in the Santiam forest reserve will be used for forestry purposes. Exchange of these lands was made possible under a law passed at the 1913 session of the legislature.

Portland Man Robbed of \$75 as He Slept—Other Travelers Contribute Funds

It is the opinion of those who were encamped at the city automobile camping grounds that a "sneak thief" of pronounced super-efficiency visited them sometime last night when many of the male portion of the campers were relieved quietly and discreetly out of their needful bank rolls.

Only the camps that were canineless suffered loss. He visited the other camps at the grounds where "doggy" did not bark.

From time immemorial men have secreted their "cash" in their trousers pockets. Even the married man has been able to retain a little change in his pockets unmolested. But now comes along a thief that has revealed the unwisdom of keeping money in the pants pocket.

Some of the men used caution to the extent of securing their pants and their bank rolls by placing the same under their pillows with a mysterious fastness for the sleepers were not awakened. The following are the victims of the "sneak thief."

O. Olson of Portland, who had come to Salem to help in the cherry harvest, suffered the biggest loss. He was relieved of \$75. Mr. Olson was not an automobile camper; he had an individual tent. "I am very happy," he is quoted, "I have many friends here," when the campers at the camp took a collection of \$11, and presented it to him. He had been working in Portland and the \$75 represented his savings.
