**Records Are Consulted**—Records filed in the office of the secretary of state more than 40 years ago were consulted here yesterday in search of information regarding Jasper Funk, at one time a resident of Lane county. The information was sought by the bureau of pensions at Washington. The records showed that Funk was committed to the state hospital for the insane when it was located in East Port-

land, on September 10, 1880. No record could be found, however, as to whether Funk was later dismissed from the institution or died while a state ward. Funk is said to have several relatives residing in Oregon, but their addresses are unknown to the secretary of state.

**Railroad Ask Concession**—The Willamette and Grand Ronde Railway company has filed with the Oregon public service commission application to construct its lines across county roads in Yamhill and Polk counties. The railroad which is now under construction will extend from Willamina, Yamhill county, to Bentley, Polk county, and will carry on both a freight and passenger business. It will connect with the Southern Pacific road at Willamina. Hearing of the application has not yet been set by the commission.

**Girl Chooses Mother**—Yesterday at the county clerk's office a notice of selection by Marvel Hill was filed. In the divorce case of Catherine Hill vs. Edward L. Hill several weeks ago, Marvel Hill held her mother in disfavor because she brought suit against her father. At the time of the trial she expressed herself as in favor of living with her father. The court honored her wishes at that time because "she was old enough to know her own mind." She is 15 years of age. Yesterday she filed papers indicating her choice; she is to live with her mother.

**Machine In Dispute**—The Palace Garage company of Portland yesterday filed a complaint against Lot Tate of Gervais at the county clerk's office. The complaint alleges that Lot Tate purchased a Ford bug some time ago by paying only a part of the purchase price and giving a contract for \$400 for the remainder. The garage company claims that they sought to regain possession of the machine but Tate refused to return the machine or to make any payments on the contract. The company seeks judgment for \$400, together with attorney's fees and court costs, or the return of the machine.

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**Lea Stays On Job**—In a statement made here yesterday, James Linn, member of the state fair board, said that A. H. Lea, who recently resigned as secretary of the board, would remain on the job until after the state fair in September. Mr. Linn also branded as false reports sent out from the capital that the board had taken any action with regard to naming a successor to Mr. Lea. Although Mr. Lea had hoped to retire from the board on July 1, he has agreed to manage this year's fair, and no action will be taken toward selecting his successor until late in the summer.

**Belated Petition Arrives**—A belated initiative petition having for its purpose the prohibiting of profiteering, trusts and monopolies and providing penalties for violations of the proposed act, was received at the office of the secretary of state yesterday. The petition was initiated by the Housewives council, of which Mrs. F. J. Kane, 83 1-3 Third street, Portland, is president. Mrs. Kane was notified by letter today that the time for filing these petitions expired on July 1, and consequently her offering would have to be rejected.

**Arguments Are Heard**—Arguments were heard before the supreme court yesterday in the case of S. H. Rockhill of Riddle against the state highway commission. This action originally was filed in the circuit court of Douglas county to restrain the highway commission from proceeding with the construction of what is known as the Canyonville cutoff section of the Pacific highway. The case was heard before Judge Skipworth of Lane county, who gave a verdict in favor of the plaintiff. The state highway commission then appealed the action to the supreme court for final determination.

PORTLAND, Or., July 6.—The launch Penguin with an outing party aboard was partially sunk in the Columbia off St. Helens yesterday as the result of a collision with the cruiser Wisdom, owned by F. W. Vogler of Portland, according to word received here today.

At least five persons were rescued from the sinking launch by Mr. Vogler and others aboard the Wisdom. They were taken into St. Helens unharmed. No lives were lost. The Penguin was towed into the shipyards at St. Helens. Both boats carried pleasure parties.

## WATER PERMITS ARE REQUESTED

**Willow Valley District Seeks to Construct Reservoir and Store Water.**

The Willow Valley Irrigation district, with headquarters at Lorella, has filed with the state engineer an application to construct a reservoir for the storage of 2550 acre feet of water for the irrigation of approximately 2000 acres of land. The project contemplates the construction of a storage reservoir covering 297 acres, a dam 22 feet high and 377 feet long, at an estimated cost of \$5800. There also will be constructed nine miles of canal at a cost of \$10,000. Applications for a permit to appropriate water have been filed by C. F. Vass, and John Valen of Waldoo, Or., covering the construction of a small reservoir for the storage of water from the right hand fork of Althouse creek for mining purposes in Josephine county.

By W. W. Herber of Newberg, covering the appropriation of water from and unnamed spring for use in steam boilers.

By F. S. Abel of Grants Pass, covering the appropriation of water from Louse creek for irrigation of a small tract in Josephine county.

By Frank J. Parent, and James Thompson, E. J. Davis and Henry Loyd of Freewater, covering the appropriation of water from Little Walla Walla river for the irrigation of 72 acres near Freewater.

By Oscar Burnside of Keating, covering the appropriation of waste water for the irrigation of 50 acres in Baker county.

By George W. Axtell of Port Orford, covering the appropriation of 25 second feet from Bald Mountain creek for placer mining purposes in Wasco county.

By B. E. Powell of Hood River, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for the irrigation of a small tract, development of one horsepower, and domestic use.

By B. H. Zimmerman, of Strassel, Washington, covering the appropriation of water from a spring for irrigation and domestic purposes.

By J. W. Halas, of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from Big creek and Buck creek for power and domestic purposes in Multnomah county.

By W. P. Counts of Grants Pass, covering the appropriation of water from Rogue river for use in steam boilers.

By G. B. Farmer of Grants Pass, covering the appropriation of water from unnamed springs for the irrigation of a small tract in Josephine county.

By George F. Young of North Powder, Or., covering the appropriation of water from North Powder river for irrigation of 62.5 acres in Union county.

**CORN AND PROVISIONS DROF.**  
CHICAGO, July 7.—Unusually sharp downturns took place today in the value of corn and provisions. Under heavy selling pressure, September and December delivery of corn dropped respectively 5 and 8 1/2 cents from Saturday's close. Big receipts and good crop conditions were the chief reasons given.

Huge stocks of provisions brought about a decline of about \$1 a barrel for pork, and \$1 a hundredweight for lard.

**Mob Storms Jail; Negroes Taken Outside of City**

PARIS, Tex., July 6.—Two negroes who last Friday shot and killed J. H. Hodges and his little son, William on their farm northeast of Paris, Tex., were taken from the jail here tonight by a mob. It was said the intention of the mob was to take the prisoners to the scene of the crime and lynch them. The negroes were arrested early last night at Valliant, Oklahoma, by officers and a posse from Paris were brought here and put in jail this afternoon.

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## WOODBURN OUT FOR REVENGE

**Scheduled to Play Local Team Here Next Sunday.**

"Revenge is sweet." Woodburn is coming to Salem next Sunday to play the Salem Senators in a return game and to regain their lost prestige when Salem defeated them two weeks ago at Woodburn. They are coming, according to advance reports, "loaded to the guards" which in baseball parlance means they are prepared to administer defeat to the local team.

Woodburn has a club qualified to be classified as a hitting team. Salem won the first game two weeks ago because of an inexperienced youngster who was doing the hurling for the Woodburn Tigers. "Kings" Cole, who hurled a wonderful game last Sunday against the late Kirkpatrick's of Portland, is in tip-top shape for next Sunday. He expects to be at his zenith when the time comes for the game next Sunday. Cole would rather win from Woodburn than any other team in the country, so the fans will not be disappointed if they come expecting him to pitch shut-out ball.
