

EDUCATION OFFER FOR ARMY MOBILIZATION

Education of German Plan
Way for Discussion
and Averts Crisis.

LOYD GEORGE IMPATIENT Demands Immediate De- struction of Cannon and Machine Guns.

SPAIN, July 7.—The German plan for aggressive mobilization to 1920, men in 15 months was presented to the representatives of the allied governments here this afternoon and was declared unsatisfactory to the allies.

The Associated Press is informed that a prominent member of the conference and it will be examined seriously and acted upon after the expected report tomorrow.

The impression in allied circles tonight is far more favorable than yesterday, the presentation of the German plan opening the way for discussion and removing danger of rupture.

Dr. Simons, German foreign minister, gave it as his opinion that the crisis had not yet passed. The only moment when there was any bitterness shown at this afternoon's session was when Premier Lloyd George said rather impatiently:

"You only have to make a law to reduce your army and execute it."

To this Simons replied: "I wish

to remind the honorable gentleman that there are parts of the British empire in which there are laws concerning the keeping of arms by subjects which the British empire is unable to enforce."

The allied demand is for immediate destruction of 12,000 cannon, which the allied commissioners in Germany have under guard, together with 50,000 machine guns. Germany desires to destroy the guns at the rate of 1000 a month. The allies hold that this is not sufficiently rapid and express fear that the machine guns will fall into the hands of insurrectionists.

The military experts of both Germany and the allies began an examination of the German plan immediately after adjournment of the conference at 7 o'clock this evening. Immediately after the conference, Premier Millerand declared to the correspondent, it was most essential that there be complete accord between the allies, and that Germany had found that accord existed. The first evidence of this, the French premier said, was that the allies declined to discuss disarmament in the absence of the representative German authorities.

Speaking of the coming financial conference in Brussels under the auspices of the league of nations, M. Millerand said it would take place on the date originally fixed, adding, "Americans will be there, you know."

Findings in the Wood Campaign Expenditures

CHICAGO, July 7.—The senate committee investigating pre-convention campaign expenditures of various candidates today resumed its hearings by delving into the organization and expenditures of backers of Major General Leonard Wood. The committee also began an exhaustive inquiry into the organization in Missouri of Governor Frank O. Lowden which did not end until early in the evening after various details of the Taft-Roosevelt fight in 1912 had been brought up by witnesses.

Chief among the witnesses were William Lee, formerly private secretary to Theodore Roosevelt and who described himself as a "sort of clearing house through which Wood funds in the east passed." X. L. Babler, republican national committee man from Missouri, and E. L. Moore of Excelsior Springs, Mo., described by witnesses as the distributor of Governor Lowden's campaign funds.

in Missouri and "boss of the third Missouri congressional district." Ben F. Kesterson of Princeton, Mo., brought in the Taft-Roosevelt issue, declaring both had spent more money in Missouri in 1912 than Lowden in 1920 and described a system of payment by blank checks for which he received \$25 each, but which, he said, were cashed for sums up to \$250. Kesterson was a Taft supporter.

After Mr. Loeb had described how a group of New York men underwrote \$1,000,000 for the Wood campaign, Senator James Reed took up the cross questioning of nearly a dozen witnesses concerning political conditions in Missouri and particularly in the third congressional district which he said was always "noted as a hotbed of political fights."

Mr. Loeb presented several check books which were transcribed into the records and which he said would show what funds he disbursed. About \$400,000 passed through his hands, he testified. He also told of sending cashier's checks for \$5000 without accompanying letters, a practice which, he asserted, was not unusual in politics. He sent these checks wherever he was told to by Frank Hitchcock, former postmaster general and a Wood manager.

Nat Goldstein and Robert Moore, two St. Louis delegates to the republican convention, previously admitted receiving \$2,500 each to help Lowden's interests, presented cancelled checks as proof they had returned the money.

J. L. Baker described the disbursement of several thousand dollars and said that sums given to E. E. McJimsey and Roscoe Patterson of Springfield, Mo., candidates for governor and congressman respectively, were intended to further the Lowden interest but the recipients might have thought the money was for their own campaigns.

Longshoreman Strike Ended at Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, July 7.—Final arrangements for the return to work of the seven thousand longshoremen and seafarers who have been on strike at this port since May 26 were completed today by representatives of the shipping interests, strike leaders and Chairman de Lacey of the industrial relations committee of the United States shipping board. The men will return tomorrow at their old rate of pay—80 cents an hour, time and a half for overtime, and double time for Sunday work.

English General Removed as Commander in India

LONDON, July 7.—An army council, after having considered a report of the Hunter investigation committee and a long statement submitted by Brigadier General R. E. P. Dyer, concerning Dyer's action in ordering troops to fire into a crowd of Indians at Amritsar, in the Punjab, upheld the commander in chief in India for removing Dyer as commander in the Punjab and from holding any further army positions in India, according to an announcement by Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war, in the house of commons today. The council also upheld the commander in chief in declining to grant Dyer further promotion and in his reduction of the pay of Dyer to one-half.

Several hundred persons were killed when the troops fired on the Indians at Amritsar last April, and many hundreds were wounded.

Negro Lynched by Mob in North Carolina Town

DURHAM, N. C., July 7.—Taken from the county jail at Roxboro by a mob of more than 200 masked men a few hours after he had been arrested on a charge of attacking a 13-year-old white girl, Ed Roach, 27, a negro, was lynched today in a churchyard three miles from the jail. Roach was hanged to a tree, a chain being used instead of a rope. As his body swung upward it was riddled with bullets.

Sheriff N. F. Thompson, who reached the jail soon after the mob had gathered, pleaded with the men to let the law take its course.

The leader of the mob is said to have given the sheriff three minutes to leave the vicinity of the jail. He left.

Negro Convict Attacks Woman Rural Mail Carrier

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 7.—Armed posses are searching for Fred Canefax, negro convict, who it is said to have attacked a white woman after escaping from a prison camp near Ellington, Mo., late yesterday, according to a report by Frederick Sill, in charge of the camp.

Sill said threats had been made to lynch Canefax if he is caught. Sill returned to Jefferson City with 14 negro prisoners from the camp.

saying that the county authorities had urged him to remove the men, fearing trouble if they are allowed to remain.

The victim of the assault is a rural route mail carrier. Sill did not know her name, he said. The assault occurred while she was making her rounds. She reported her assailant was in convict garb, according to Sill.

Governor Crossley has offered a reward of \$300 for the apprehension of Canefax, who was under 20-year sentence for robbery in the first degree.

Poles and Czech-Slavs Fail to Reach Agreement

PARIS, July 7.—The council of ambassadors has notified the Polish and Czech-Slav that no agreement has been reached by them to arbitrate the Teschen question, a plebiscite in that region will be held.

Spokane Store Cleared of Profiteering Charge

SPOKANE, Wash., July 7.—The Culbertson, Grote-Rankin company, a department store was found not guilty by a jury in United States district court tonight of a charge of violating the Lever act against profiteering. The company was indicted by the grand jury February 7. Demonstrating the constitutionality of the Lever act was overruled by Judge Frank H. Rudkin April 1. The trial lasted six days. The government attorney introduced original cost slips to show profits of 110 to 150 per cent. Judge Rudkin ruled that the store has the right to consider present market value as well as original costs in fixing sales prices.

Bolshevik Eager to Re-open Trade with Allies

COPENHAGEN, July 7.—A rumor is current in diplomatic circles here today that M. Tchitcherine, Bolshevik foreign minister, will go to London to resume the negotiations for the re-opening of trade between Russia and the allied countries, for which it is considered that M. Krasin, Bolshevik minister of trade and commerce, lacks the necessary political and diplomatic ability.

Mr. Meighen, New Premier of Canada, is Westerner

OTTAWA, July 7.—The presidency of the privy council, vacated by Mr. Rowell, probably will be assumed by Mr. Meighen. In the event the department of the interior over which the new premier now presides will be merged with immigration and colonization. F. R. Green and H. H. Stevens, both members from British Columbia, are mentioned for the ministry of customs, while F. B. McCurdy is spoken of as a probable cabinet appointment from Nova Scotia.

Vice Pres. Marshall Makes Plea for Americanism

LOS ANGELES, July 7.—Responsibility for the future of the American nation rests not alone on its officials but on every citizen's shoulders. Vice President Marshall said here today in an address before the city club.

"We have gone legislation mad in this country," the vice president asserted.

Mr. Marshall made a plea for Americanism, declaring there was no room under the flag for any but American citizens.

Several Changes in Canadian Cabinet Announced

OTTAWA, July 7.—Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, who was recommended by Sir Robert as his successor, has accepted the invitation of the governor general to form a new ministry.

The announcement of these changes is accompanied by the statement that two ministers of the Borden administration, N. W. Rowell, president of the cabinet, and Martin Bull, are retiring from the government.

Grounded Transport is Floated and Resumes Trip

PORT ANGELES, Wash., July 7.—The United States army transport South Bend, which grounded Tuesday off the mouth of the Elwha river while trying to make Port Angeles harbor in a fog, was floated at 7:30 o'clock tonight and is proceeding to Port Angeles, according to word received here. She will resume her voyage to Seward, Alaska tomorrow. Lieutenant General Hunter Liggett, commander of the western department of the army, is a passenger on the South Bend. It was learned today. He is on his way for an inspection of Alaska army posts. The South Bend was bound from San Francisco to Seward when she went aground. She carries men and supplies for the Alaska engineering commission.

Spanish City Visited By a Disastrous Fire

TOLEDO, Spain, July 7.—Fire has destroyed a big mill in the village of Villaseca, with enormous quantities of wheat and flour. It is estimated that the damage will amount to four million pesetas. At the same time the electric power house adjoining was destroyed, leaving 15 villages in the province of Toledo without light, while the irrigation works were damaged to such an extent that a quarter of a million acres are without water.

Oregon Timber Included in Wheeler's Holdings

PORTLAND, Or., July 7.—Timber land in eight counties of Oregon valued at approximately \$1,000,000 and more than \$8,000 on deposit in local banks are included in the estate of the late Nelson P. Wheeler of Endeavor, Ore., who died in Pasadena, Calif., March 3, 1920, according to a petition filed in the circuit court here today by Nelson P. Wheeler, Jr., asking that the will of his father be admitted to probate and T. H. Ward, a Portland attorney, be appointed administrator of the estate in Oregon.

Mr. Wheeler left an estate consisting of personal property valued at approximately \$3,500,000 and real estate in several states valued at \$2,000,000 according to a transcript of the petition filed in Pennsylvania.

Colored People Protest Against Paris Lynching

AUSTIN, Tex., July 7.—Protest against the lynching of two negroes, Irving and Herman Arthur, Tuesday night at Paris, Texas, is contained in a telegram received at today by Acting Governor Johnson from the national association for the advancement of colored people. The governor was notified today local officers could control the situation. The negroes are charged with killing a white farmer and his son during a dispute over money.
