PASTOR PLACES YOUTH N HOME

Frank Brown, 11, Happy is Turned over to Prominent Polk Couple.

Frank Brown, the 11-year-old boy who was recently placed in the care of Rev. H. N. Aldrich by Judge G. M. Bushey for the purpose of finding a suitable home for the lad, has been placed by Mr. Aldrich in one of the best homes in Polk county. The family will adopt the boy as soon as legal impediments are removed and satisfactory arrangements are made. The case of the unfortunate boy who was on the verge of being sent to the state industrial school touched the hearts of many families in Marion county, for, according to Rev. Aldrich he received applications from some of the best families in this community. One family that came to Salem yesterday from Woodburn were disappointed because they were unable to take the lad home with them. The boy had already been placed in the Polk county home.

The Woodburn couple were an elderly family. No child's voice had ever disturbed the silence in their home. They have lived a lonely life, and now in the afternoon of their lives they have the comforts of life; property, they have; money, they have, but not a child to share the joys of life with them.

They acquired a little dog the other day and now the dog plays on the floor—plays alone. The elderly couple agreed that if they only had a small boy to play with the little pup in their home, they would have an ideal home. The boy's prattling of young tug at the heart strings of old people. Soon after they had expressed their desire for a boy they read of Frank Brown. They immediately phoned to Mr. Aldrich and then yesterday they came to Salem to take the boy home with them, but they came too late as the boy was already placed in the Polk county home.

Several applicants coming from good families indicated to Mr. Aldrich that the people had their hearts in the right place. It is obvious that Marion county citizens have high regard for citizenship. Corrective institutions serve a need in national life; in fact, they are a necessity, but they are not conducive to building character. Character built by home environment is the strongest security for a virile national life.

Yesterday before Mr. Aldrich took the lad to the Polk county home, they visited the penitentiary. After relating the circumstances about the boy to one of the inmates, the prisoner offered to contribute some money to help the lad. This the pastor refused to accept as there was no necessity for it. One of the penitentiary inmates contributed a pair of shoes that fit the 11-year-old boy. This gift according to Mr. Aldrich, lighted the face of the inmate with happiness, because they were able to do something for the unfortunate boy.

"I would rather go to the reform school than to return to my father. If my father takes me home, I will run away again."

This statement made before the state prisoners was the impulse for a short lecture from one of their members. One of them stated that he had been sent to the reform school, and now he is in the penitentiary. He admonished the boy to go straight. "Oh, they send them to reform schools first and then they come here," was the startled reply of the boy after hearing the remarks of the inmates.

Rev. H. N. Aldrich says that if he had had a dozen boys he could have placed them in as many good homes. There are many families willing to help play indicated by the requests that came to him during the last two days.
