

Aero Club Plans to Enter International Contest

NEW YORK, July 8.—The Aero Club of America announced today that it has selected the following to represent the United States in the international airplane race to be held in France the week of September 27: Air service, United States army, airplane to be piloted by Major R. W. Schroeder.

Aero Club of Texas, entry four, by S. E. J. Cox, pilot to be named who will use Curtis plane.

Dayton-Wright division of General Motors, Howard Rinehart.

The James Gordon Bennett trophy for this event is now held by France. Rinehart and Major Schroeder are in Dayton, Ohio, preparing their planes.

Major Schroeder will use a specially designed speed plane, while the ship to be piloted by Rinehart is being completed in secret.

Deplorable and Demoralizing Railroad Traffic Conditions

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Declaring their business to be threatened with destruction, representatives of nearly a dozen industries today asked the interstate commerce commission to revoke or modify its order requiring railroads to accord preference to coal mines east of the Mississippi river in the assignment of open top cars.

Speaker after speaker at the commission's open hearings declared his business would be forced to close down and his employees thrown out of work unless the order was rescinded or modified. There were no indications, however, that the commission would make any change in the order, which was issued two weeks ago for the purpose of relieving coal shortages throughout the eastern states.

Industries protesting against the order included those manufacturing or dealing in crushed stone, cement, sand, gravel and lime and also general building contractors. Preceding testimony of their representatives, the commission heard Daniel Wilford, chairman of the advisory commission of the Association of Railway Executives, who declared that priority of service favoring the more essential commodities was necessary.

I. W. W. OBTAIN DECISION

BELLINGHAM, Wash., July 8.—Holding that the Industrial Workers of the World is a political organization and that its activities cannot be restrained by a court order, Judge Ed H. Hardin, of the Whatcom county superior court here today denied application of the county prosecuting attorney for an injunction against four alleged I. W. W. which would restrain them from actively engaging in I. W. W. propaganda. If members of the organization violate the law, Judge Hardin ruled, that fact must be determined by a jury in a criminal court.

Forest Patrol Airplane Forced Down in Mountains

PORTLAND, July 8.—Don Davis, observer, and Cadet Heyes Payette, pilot of a forest patrol airplane which left Medford for Eugene yesterday and was not thereafter seen, reported by telephone to forest headquarters here today that they were safe in the mountains after a forced landing. The delay in reporting, they said, was due to difficulty of accessibility from the place where they descended to a telephone station.

General Wood Will Hold Conference with Harding

CHICAGO, July 8.—General Leonard Wood plans to hold a conference soon with Senator W. G. Harding, Republican presidential nominee, at Marion, Ohio, it was announced today following a meeting of the general and national chairman Hays. Coleman Du Pont, Republican national committeeman from Delaware, visited Republican headquarters today to complete arrangements for notification ceremonies at Senator Harding's home in Marion on July 22.

Portland City Attorney On Milk Investigation

PORTLAND, July 8.—In a preliminary report filed today with the mayor, Lionel C. Mackay, deputy city attorney, who is investigating a recent increase in the price of milk, said that he had learned the Oregon Dairymen's league was selling its product for \$2.50 a hundred pounds to condensaries, but charged \$3.20 to distributors and had proposed to increase this latter charge to \$3.80. He said he had asked for an explanation and would await a reply from the league before filing his final report.

Columbia River Ports Fear Bubonic Plague

ASTORIA, Or., July 8.—In order to guard against possible invasion of Columbia river ports by bubonic plague, strict regulations of shipping were put into force today, both in Astoria and Portland. This decision was the result of a conference here between Harbor Masters Jacob Speier of Portland and John Sweet of the port of Astoria.

Under these regulations every vessel docking at a wharf within the confines of the two ports will be required to place rat guards at least three feet in diameter on their lines to prevent the rats from coming ashore.

ROADS TO DUBLIN GUARDED

DUBLIN, July 8.—Ten of the main roads into Dublin have been occupied since last night by soldiers, who erected barriers of barbed wire where they halt and question occupants of all passing motor cars. The reason for this has not been disclosed, but it is understood the military believe the Sinn Féiners are about to change the place of detention of General Lucas, who with Colonels Danford and Tyrrell, was seized at a hut near Fermoy, county Cork, late in June. General Lucas was taken to an unknown destination, but the others escaped.

Mackay School Receives \$25,000 for New Branch

RENO, Nev., July 8.—Advises that the department of the interior had approved the establishment of a precious metals experimental station in connection with the Mackay school of mines at the University of Nevada, were received here today by President Water E. Clark of the university. The government will provide \$25,000 as a maintenance fund for ten scientists who will be brought here from the Colorado School of Mines at Golden, Colo.

William Howard Taft Predicts G. O. P. Victory

MONTREAL, July 8.—Former President William Howard Taft issued this statement here tonight: "I have absolute confidence that the approaching presidential election in the United States will result in the success of the republican ticket and that we shall have the league of nations with the reservations necessary for the guidance and protection of our country."
