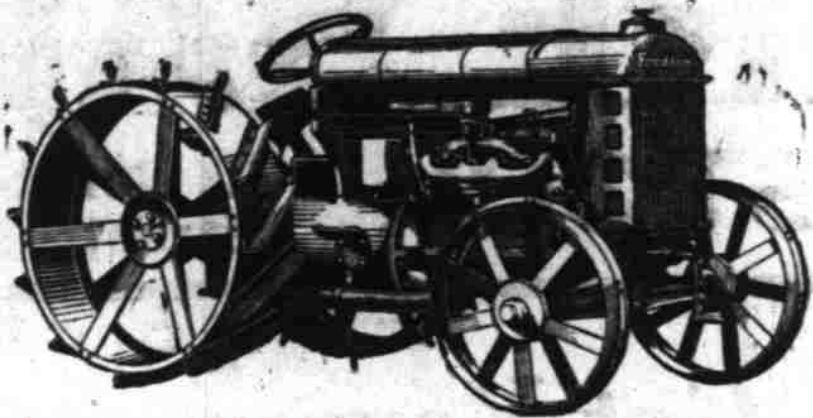

More Road Improvements Planned by Commission

Sealed bids for the construction of several culverts and the improvement of considerable roads in Douglas, Lane, Polk and Sherman counties, will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland on July 29, according to announcement made here.

The proposed improvements follow:
Douglas county—Reinforced concrete culverts between Comstock and Lane county line, 105 cubic yards of concrete, 9000 pounds of metal reinforcement, 20 linear feet of corrugated iron pipe and 84 linear feet of concrete pipe.
Lane county—Goldson section, 11.2 miles grading.

Polk county—Yamhill county line—Butler's store, McMinnville-Tillamook highway, 7.6 miles grading and rocking.

Sherman county—Columbia river highway, 14.8 miles graveled.
In the event bids for these improvements are satisfactory, actual building operations probably will start late in the present month.

The big tent is expected to arrive here tomorrow and will be erected centrally located, thus making it a pleasure for the people to attend on the court house lawn, which is evenings.

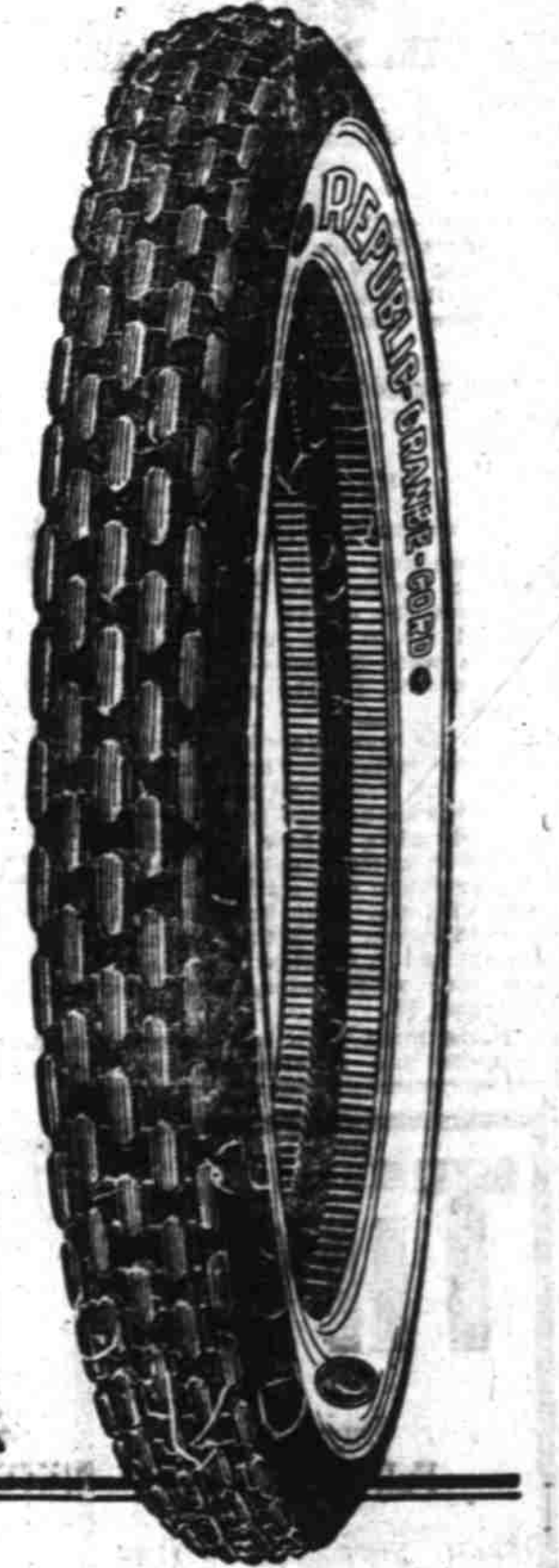
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
