CROSBY PASSES ON RESERVOIR

Expert Geologist Declares Benham Falls Basin Will Hold Water.

The proposed Benham Falls reclamation reservoir above Bend has been approved by Professor W. C. Crosby, of Washington, D. C., connected with the federal reclamation service and who is one of the nation's foremost geologists. He also approves the proposed dam site. After an exhaustive study of the location from a geological point of view, Professor Crosby has submitted his report to Percy A. Cupper, state engineer.

Soil Is Water-Tight. Doubt has existed as to whether the proposed reservoir would hold water. The Crosby report declares it will. The reservoir will be constructed as soon as arrangements can be made for financing the project, and it will be formulated from a basin of about 20,000 acres which will be flooded and the water held by a huge dam. The estimated cost

of the reservoir is in excess of \$1,000,000. The reservoir will be used to distribute water to the big Deschutes project, composed of a number of units, totaling about 200,000 acres. The north unit is now making final surveys preparatory for construction.

It has voted \$5,000,000 bonds and has issued \$50,000. The Tumalo unit already has about 8000 acres under irrigation.

Cost Is Appropriated. Several years ago the state and the federal government each appropriated \$50,000 for investigation of certain projects, of which the Deschutes was one, and part of the money was applied to the Crosby examination. It is believed construction of the dam and reservoir will be under way in six or eight months.

To Keep Straightest, Unrliest Hair in Curl
