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Salem Orchardist Talks
Oregon evaporated apples are used to blend the champagne of France, according to Fred A. Kurtz, of Salem, who came to Portland on business yesterday and threw up his hands and quit when he saw the Shriners, says the Morning Oregonian. Last year Mr. Kurtz' plant at Salem handled 6000 tons of apples and they were sent to Japan, France and England, as well as having an American market. Mr. Kurtz states

that New York will buy all of the dried prunes which he can send them. The father of Mr. Kurtz planted the first prune orchard in the Willamette valley and his sons have studied the dried fruit game until they have evolved machinery especially adapted to that purpose. Now apples can be shoveled from the railroad car right into the conveyors and the fruit never stops moving until it is packed and goes out the door. Belts carry the fruit upstairs and down into the rooms and out again, the whole arrangement being a great labor saving plant. Mr. Kurtz has his own system of advertising. When a dealer in the east sells 10 carloads \$1000 is spent for newspaper advertising.

Debs May Have to Direct Campaign from Prison

DETROIT, July 12.—Unless he is pardoned, Eugene V. Debs, presidential nominee of the socialist party, will direct the party's campaign this summer from the Atlanta federal prison, where he is serving a sentence for violation of the espionage laws, the socialist national committee decided today.

The committee decided first, however, to make an appeal to President Wilson for Debs' release. About 200 socialists plan to call on the president soon and urge him to act on the request made by a similar committee to Secretary Tamm.
