DAMAGE ACTION GETS REVERSAL

Portland Picketing Cases Are Slated for Reargument by Supreme Court.

The supreme court yesterday reversed the action of Oma Emmons vs. The Southern Pacific company, appellant, a case coming up from the lower court for Multnomah county over which Judge C. U. Gantenben presided. In a suit for damages because of personal injuries received in a collision between an automobile and an electric train at Beaverton. The opinion was written by Justice Burnett.

The supreme court announced that the Portland picketing cases will be reargued next Friday. Two cases involving the question of picketing, particularly as it affects establishments branded as "unfair", are before the court. They are Teitkemper, plaintiff, vs. the Portland Central Labor council and Greenfield, plaintiff, vs. the labor council.

The court issued a permit to J. W. Brooks, Walla Walla attorney, to practice law before the courts of Oregon. He will not remove to this state, but a portion of his practice is in Oregon.

Other opinions handed down follow: C. F. Ward, appellant, vs. A. M. McKinley et al; appeal from Deschutes county; appeal for damages for alleged breach of contract; opinion by Chief Justice McBride; Judge T. E. J. Duffy reversed and case remanded.

E. P. Noonan, appellant, vs. city of Seaside; appeal from Clatsop county; suit to restrain the city from issuing bonds; opinion by Justice Benson; Judge J. A. Eakin affirmed.

Sidney Smyth, administrator of the estate of Harry Howard, vs. Kenwood Land company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action to recover damages; opinion by Justice Harris; Judge J. T. Kavanaugh affirmed.

School district No. 1, Clatsop county, vs. Astoria Construction company et al, appellants; appeal from Clatsop county; action to recover money; opinion by Justice Benson; Judge J. A. Eakin reversed.

B. Cody vs. Hugh Black, appellant, appeal from Douglas county; action in ejectment; opinion by Justice Benson; Judge J. W. Hamilton affirmed.

Berta K. White vs. D. C. White, appellant; motion for additional suit money and maintenance during pendency of appeal denied by Chief Justice McBride.

Tom Deouss, petitioner and appellant, vs. T. M. Hurburt, sheriff of Multnomah county; appeal from Multnomah county; application for writ of habeas corpus; opinion by Justice Johns; Judge Robert G. Morrow affirmed.

Secretary Howell, Recent Visitor Here, is Dead

F. M. Howell, secretary of state for Washington, who was in Salem immediately following the Shriners' convocation in Portland to pay his respects to Secretary of State Sam Koser and other Oregon officials, died at his home in Tacoma shortly before noon yesterday. His death came after a short illness of appendicitis. He leaves a widow and a son.

Mr. Howell for years has been a prominent figure in the political life of the state of Washington. He also took an active part in the military organizations of the state, rising to a captaincy in the national guards.

For a time he was the auditor of Pierce county, and from that position he rose to secretary of state. He served two terms in this office.

He was among the early settlers in Washington, having arrived in Tacoma with his parents in 1856 when two years old. The funeral is to be held at Olympia, the state capital, under the auspices of state officials and the Elks.

Jefferson Man's Claim Must Go to Legislature

W. E. Moses of Jefferson, whose automobile was stolen by two boys from the state training school and which was badly damaged when the boys accidentally ran it into a ditch, has been referred by the board of control to the state legislature upon his presentation of a claim for \$100 to pay for repairs on the car.

The boys were Happy Harris, who was on parole and employed at the state tuberculosis hospital, and Chester Jensen, who was at work on a farm. Jensen was severely injured in the accident.

or must await action of the legislature through appropriation, is a question that is yet to be determined.

Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, superintendent of the hospital, presented the subject to the state board of control yesterday, but action was deferred. Dr. Steiner objects to awaiting action of the legislature, since the building is badly needed.

The barn is believed to have been set on fire by John Leonard, Italian patient who escaped early Monday morning. It was 42x105 feet in dimensions and it is estimated that \$20,000 would be necessary to rebuild it at present costs of material.

Frank Joseph Diem Dies at His Home Near Salem

Frank Joseph Diem died at his home on rural route 8 yesterday at the age of 84 years. He leaves four children, John Diem of Raymond, Wash., Frank Diem, Robert Diem and Mrs. Frances Gairner, all at home. He is also survived by six grandchildren. The funeral will be held under the direction of the Terwilliger funeral home Thursday morning at 10 o'clock at St. Joseph's Catholic church. Burial will be in the Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Bernice I. Davis Dies at Portland Hospital

Mrs. Bernice I. Davis died at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. She was 25 years old and formerly lived in Salem. She leaves beside her husband.
