

## Portland Man Ejected, Sues Local Merchant

To be accused of talking like a Bolshevik was sufficient reason for A. White to order W. E. Stone out of his place of business at 211 State street yesterday. Mr. Stone filed a charge of assault and battery against White. Mr. White pleaded not guilty when arraigned before Judge G. E. Unruh and his hearing was set for July 19. He claims he merely ordered Stone out of the store.

Stone represents a Portland house and was in Salem in the interests of his firm. While in the store of D. A. White & Sons yesterday Mr.

White is said to have intimidated that Stone's firm was unreliable, whereupon Mr. Stone, according to his complaint asked White if he did not believe that the laws of the state would protect him from fakers. He claims that Mr. White replied in the negative.

"That's Bolshevik talk," was Stone's rejoinder.

White ejected Stone from the store.

## China May Have to Use Troops to Stop Robbers

CHENG TU, China, July 14.—Depredations of robber bands along trade routes in Szechuen province have become so flagrant and widespread that urgent appeals for the use of troops to combat the menace have been sent to the Chinese provincial authorities by foreign firms operating in Szechuen.

One recent report that was brought to Chengtu was of the robbery of a pack train on the "big road," which is the main highway between Chungking and Chengtu. In this 40 bags of mail were opened and rifled by the outlaws and "the whole hillside was covered with stolen mail."

In another case a caravan had been held up and robbed by a band of bandits when a second stronger band of brigands appeared and compelled the return of the stolen goods. The leader of the smaller band was then shot. The chieftain who did this declared that he had guaranteed the safe passage of this particular caravan, having received a substantial consideration.

The activities of the bandits are felt as much by the individual as by the large commercial interests in the opinion of one Chengtu mission worker, who said:

"It is a grievous hardship to send to America for a suit of clothes, pay for it at the present ruinous prices, wait patiently six months for its arrival and finally hear that it has been appropriated by robbers within a very few days of its destination."

### PEARL SEASON OPENS

PAPEETE, Tahiti, July 14.—The opening of the pearl diving season, the greatest event of the year in the French Settlements, comes in July. Diving is not permitted for two years in succession at the same island. The various pearl islands are opened in rotation. This means that all gear, stocks of merchandise and building material must be taken to a new island each year—no small undertaking when it is remembered that the coral atoll, which in ordinary times supports less than 200 persons, becomes in the diving season the abiding place of 2500 or more.

This year the open island is Hikueru, one of the Paumotu archipelago 400 miles to the eastward of Tahiti.

Already this lonely atoll is taking on a metropolitan appearance. The profits to be gained come not only from the pearl shell won from the lagoon but from the sale of all kinds of wares dear to the native heart and from the providing of entertainment to refresh the weary diver and his women folk after the labors of the day are over. The average native diver wins a good sum from the bottom of the lagoon and much of it goes on expensive silk dresses for his wife and daughters, on the delectable canned goods of the "popai" (white man) and on the "movies."

This year there are to be, it is said, three moving picture theaters, any number of motor cars for hire, the length of the roadway in Hikueru is less than a half mile, but that apparently does not make any difference—a brass band and, it is reported, electric lights along the "Great White Way" of this little ring of coral sand.

ate advices indicate that the season this year at Hikueru will be the most active in many years. It is estimated there will be at least a thousand divers on the island. These together with their families and the traders with their staffs, will swell up the population of the island during the season to nearly 4000.

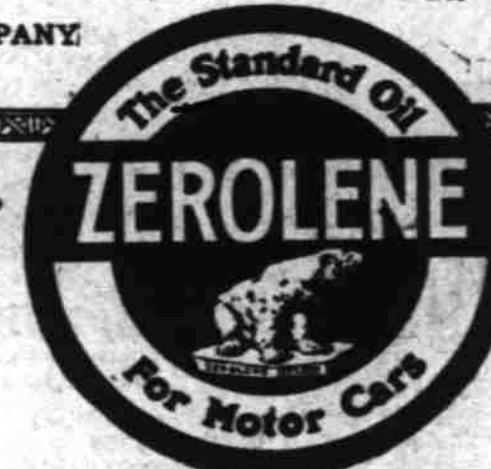
