RECRUIT RULES

ARE CHANGED

United States Navy Reverts

to Pre-War Basis in

Accepting Men.

The United States navy department has reverted to a pre-war basis in regard to the requirements of recruits, according to a recent order received at the local navy recruiting station.

Since 1917 the physical standards have been to accept only recruits of good growth. It was required that no young man 17 years old could be accepted for service if he weighed less than 120 pounds. That was the minimum weight. For young men between the ages of 18, 19 and 20 the minimum weight was fixed at 128 pounds.

Standards Changed
The physical standards now made effective by recent orders from the navy department provides that young men 17 years old will be accepted for naval service if they do not fall below the minimum weight of 110 pounds. The minimum weight for young men 18 years old is 115 pounds; for 19 years old, 120 pounds and for 20 years, 125 pounds. The minimum height of the physical standard is five feet and two inches.

Attention is also called in an order from the navy department that ex-navy men re-enlisting within a year after their discharge will receive a bonus of four months pay, have the privilege of choosing their own ship, will receive a 30-day leave at full pay, and also have the opportunity to select any trade school they may desire to attend. The navy has 22 trade schools.

Reserve Men Get Bonus
Men in the naval reserve are also eligible to the bonus, according to the statement of E. G. Gates, chief boatswain's mate of the local recruiting station. He says that the opportunity for new recruits to select some trade school is accessible if the new applicant is qualified to carry on the work he desires to study.

The act of May 18, 1920, increased the pay in the navy service. Chief petty officers now receive \$126 as the base pay with the extra bonuses remaining the same. The first class petty officer receives a pay of \$84, the second class petty officer, \$72; third class petty officer \$60 and the first class non-rated men, the fireman is an exception for he receives a base pay of \$60 a month.

by California Automobile

The 11-year-old son of G. H. Doersch was run over yesterday by a California touring car driven by a man who gave his name as Olson. The lad was unconscious for a time and is now at the Willamette sanitarium. The accident occurred in front of a store near the Miles ranch south of Salem.

Mr. Doersch claims that his son was riding on the rear end of a truck. When the truck stopped in front of the store, he said, his son ran in front of the California car.

Olson assisted in listening the youngster to the Willamette sanitarium. At a late hour yesterday it was not ascertained how serious the injury was.
