

GAINS REPORTED BY O. P. HOFF

State Treasurer Submits Semi-Annual Report to Secretary of State.

That during the six months ending June 30 revenue coming into the state treasury from all sources has continued to grow, is the claim of O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, in compiling his semi-annual report. The report is submitted to the secretary of state for use in the semi-annual examination of the state treasurer's books.

Mr. Hoff attributes the increasing revenues to a policy of keeping all

money safely invested. The report shows a total of \$356,759.01 in interest earnings for the last six months, which segregated as to funds is as follows:

State deposits, \$32,094.75; common school funds, \$198,198.26; agricultural college fund, \$4,868.16; university fund, \$2,514.28; rural credits fund, \$25,238.42; segregated accident fund, \$54,198.92; industrial accident fund, \$34,646.21. Comparing figures Mr. Hoff shows that the interest earning for the corresponding six months' period of 1919 and 1918 totaled respectively \$318,643.10 and \$276,840.12.

On June 30 there was a total cash balance with state depositories of \$3,120,354.39. The daily balance in the active account has been reduced to \$56,498.59. To the policy of keeping the active account at a minimum Mr. Hoff attributes a considerable increase in interest earnings. Funds of the state treasury

are on deposit in 193 banks of the state.

The treasurer has continued a policy of collecting interest on school loans semi-annually and says the policy is without opposition.

COOS BAY ELKS ARE ASKING FOR 1921 ASSEMBLY

Six Special Coaches Necessary to Bring Marshfield Delegation.

OTHER TOWNS EAGER

Complete Program for Three Day Meet is Announced By Committee.

The Marshfield delegation of Elks, coming in a train of six special coaches, is going to be a strong contender for the 1921 session of the Elks of Oregon when the question comes to a vote at the third annual convention, to be held in this city July 22 to 24, inclusive.
