

## SEATS SELLING RAPIDLY FOR FORTHCOMING BOXING PROGRAM

Seats for the four boxing bouts to be held under the auspices of the Salem lodge of Elks during the state convention here next week are going to be at a premium long before the day of the fights if the first few hours of the seat sale are any indication of what the demand for tickets is going to be.

The seat sale opened Thursday afternoon, and up to noon yesterday over 500 ringside seats had been sold and applications for tickets from all parts of the state were swamping the members of the committee in charge.

Portland Puts in Orders

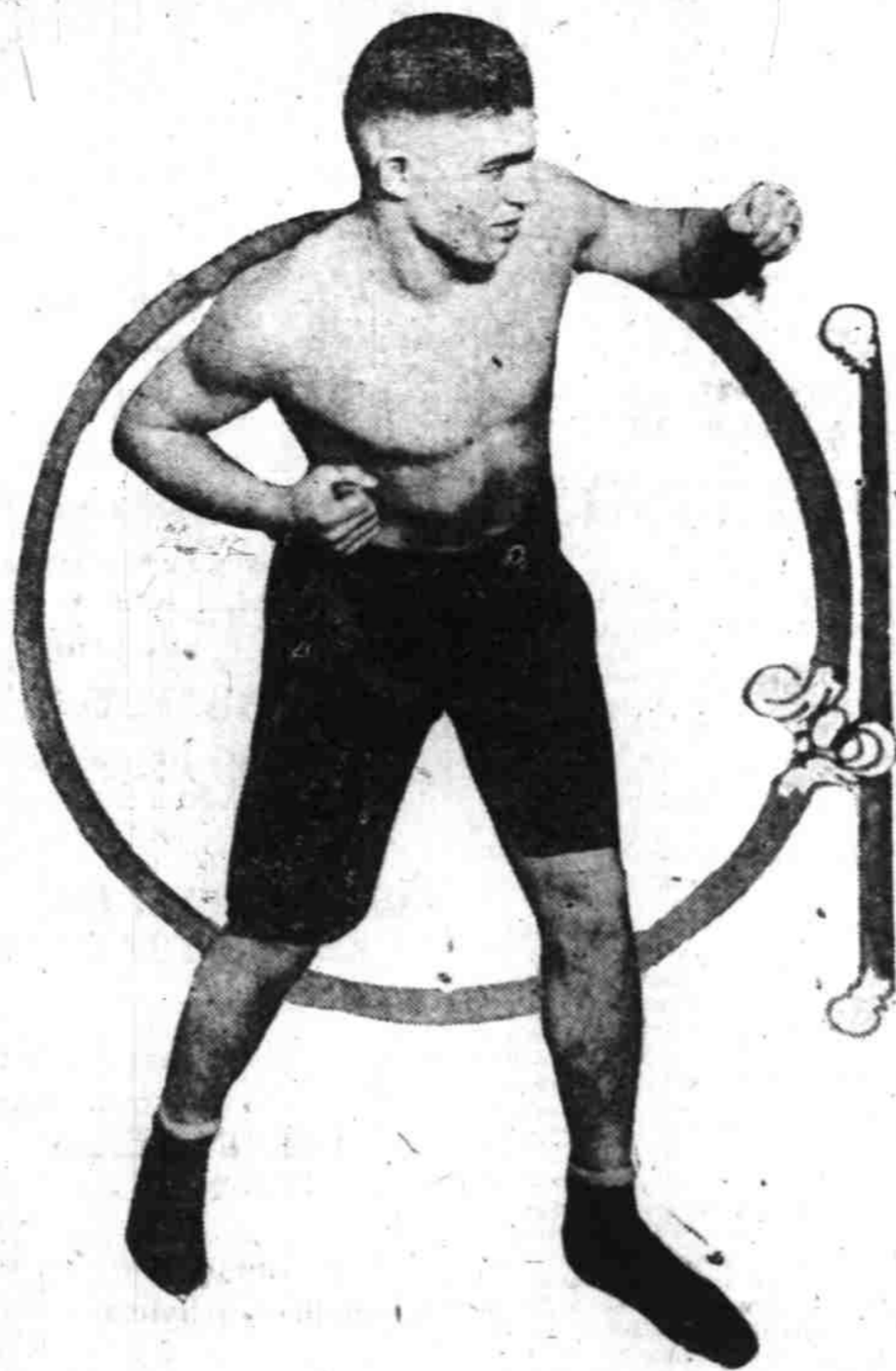

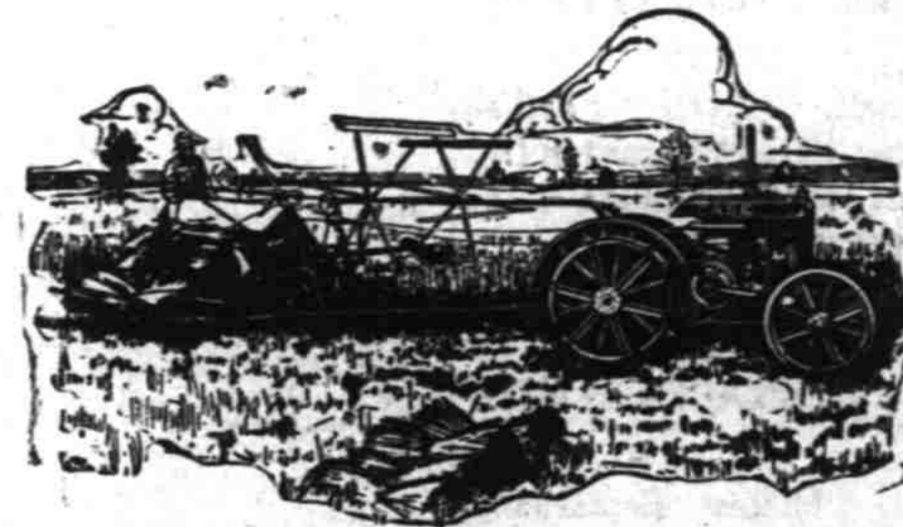
### YEARLED FOR THE IMPOSSIBLE
