Two Fatalities Reported.—Two fatal accidents out of a total of 416 industrial casualties were reported to the state accident commission for the week ending July 15. The fatal cases were Joseph Stanock, silversmith, lumberman, and John Murphy, Burns, construction worker. Of the total number of accidents reported, 374 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 25 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act, and 21 were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.

POTATOES TO BE INSPECTED

College Expert Will Be Here in Few Days, McCroskey Announces.

A letter has been received by T. E. McCroskey, manager of the Commercial club, that George R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops at Oregon Agricultural college, will be in the city in the near future to inspect the certified potatoes planted by some of the farmers in this locality. The visit of Professor Hyslop is in extension of the work that the Marion County Community federation is attempting. Mr. McCroskey says the inspection would be expedited if those obtaining certified seed which they have planted would report their names to the Commercial club at the earliest date. Professor Hyslop's visits will be made in a car, using the Commercial club as his headquarters. According to Mr. McCroskey it will necessitate three distinct trips by the professor in order to cover the entire territory in Marion county.

Hyslop comes to inspect the certified potatoes so that he can make his report. It is in connection with this work that the Marion County Community federation suggested that Marion county create an office of agriculturist.

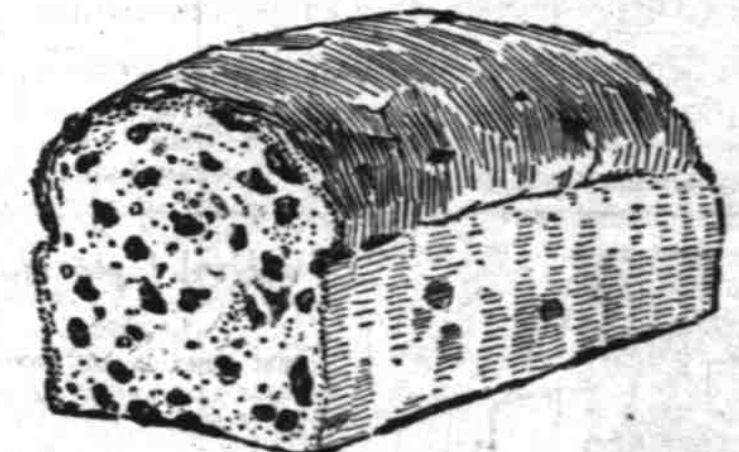
