## Federal Employees Ask Increased Wages

CHICAGO, July 17.—A nationwide campaign by federal employees to obtain pay increases will start soon. Charles F. Nagl, vice-president of the national federation of federal employees, announced today. "Nobody can be efficient if he receives less than a living wage," Mr. Nagl said, "and we are asking that \$3 a day be set by congress as the minimum daily wage of federal employees."

## Fine Barn is Planned By Silvertown Farmer

SILVERTOWN, Ore., July 17.—Special to The Statesman—C. F. Schmedeche, who lives three miles west of Silvertown, is making plans for the erection of a modern new barn. The actual building will begin early in the fall. The barn will be 84 by 26 feet, with double walls, cement floors. 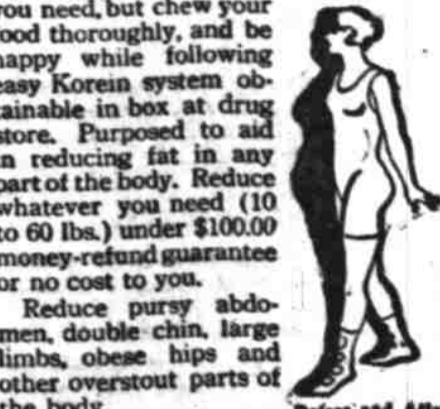
plaintiff became discouraged at the work and deserted the defendant, thus forcing the defendant to hire another car to complete the sale of the insurance. Under the circumstances, he states in his answer, Mr. Buchanan is not entitled to any commissions and asks judgment against him for the suit costs.
