STRANGE MAN IS EXAMINED

Actions Indicate Insanity, But Physician Finds Johnson is Sane.

Bewhiskered, unkempt and unwashed, was William Johnson who was brought to the sheriff's office yesterday from Aumsville by Alee Merrifield.

The man's queer actions, his utter unconcern for personal needs, personal appearance and cleanliness, and his inability to answer coherently questions asked him, led Merrifield to believe him insane. Merrifield subsequently brought his charge to the sheriff's office for examination.

A physician was summoned and upon examination he declared the man sane and that he was merely suffering from exposure and hunger. The doctor said Johnson was harmless and he was released by the sheriff's office. Johnson said he was 34 years old April 26.

When asked questions Johnson's replies indicated that he was far from being rational. When asked by the sheriff what his name was and what his nationality, he replied:

"I was born not very far from here."
While he was being questioned he said he was out of funds and had not had anything to eat for a couple of days. He carried with him an old sack containing some potatoes. He planned on preparing tubers for his food later.

"Can you drive a team?" he was asked by Sheriff Needham.

"No, I am not a married man," was his quick reply.

All questions simply stated failed to elicit an intelligent answer from Johnson, according to the sheriff's office.
