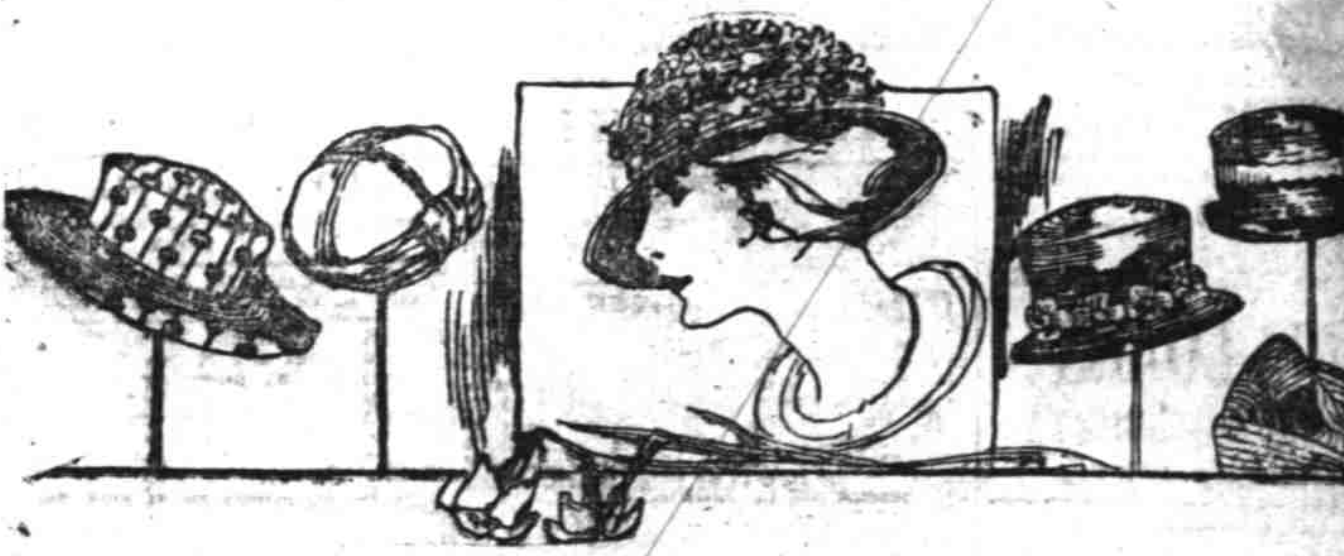
"No, I'm not cold," I returned rather shortly.
